

First Bonds Sold In Campaign for St. Anne's School

Enthusiasm by speakers and the spirit of the opening dinner held Tuesday night in St. Anne's Parish Hall, Brighton Park, Rochester, 150 workers are working to sign up \$25,000 in Victory bonds as a nucleus fund for a new school building.

First donations turned over to the Rev. George J. Schmitt, pastor, were those of a \$500 bond from St. Anne's Holy Name Society and a \$25 bond from the St. Anne's Boy Scout Troop.

The next report meeting will be held on Tuesday evening, Nov. 20 when an address will be given by Rev. John S. Randall, managing editor of the Catholic Courier-Journal and diocesan director, Society for the Propagation of the Faith.

Parishioners of St. Anne's were praised at the dinner Tuesday evening by the Rev. Dr. Charles J. Mahoney, superintendent, Catholic Schools, Diocese of Rochester for their zeal and enthusiasm to give their children a religious education.

Doctor Mahoney reviewed the work of pioneer priests and Catholic laymen in Western New York, many of whom he stated, had built Catholic schools with their own hands. He pointed out that Catholic people today who contribute to the construction of Catholic schools are reflecting the indomitable spirit of their Catholic forefathers.

"They are heeding the words of Christ, 'Suffer the little children to come unto Me,' the school superintendent stated.

Father Schmitt in expressing appreciation for the work being done in his parish said the workers comprised "the finest group of workers," he had ever seen assembled.
