Washington — (NC) — Acknowledgement of the validity of moral precepts and acceptance of the Christian principle that we are members one of another were declared by British Prime Minister Clement Attlee in his address to Congress here to be indispensable if our present civilization is to survive.

"Man's material discoveries have outpaced his moral progress," he said. "The greatest task that faces us today is to bring

... to all people, before it is too late, that our civilization can only survive by the acceptance and practice in international relations and in our national life of the Christian principle that we are members one of another."


Speaking of the ties which bind the United States and Britain, he said: "Above all we share the things of the spirit. Both of our nations hold dear the rule of law, the conception of freedom and the principles and methods of democracy; and most vital of all we acknowledge the validity of the moral precepts upon which our whole civilization is founded."



Prague — (NC) — Protests against the desecration of Sundays and feastdays by voluntary work-in factories and mines have been made from many Catholic pulpits in this city. Some time ago, Communists started a movement to donate pay-free working hours to the republic and the party statisticians are now busy publicizing the millions of working hours that have been donated by members of the party.

While Catholics, of course, do not object to workers donating extra hours in order to speed up the revival of industry in this country, they are definitely opposed to the resulting desecration of Sundays, the more so since very often workmen have to leave their factories on week days to take part in public demonstrations.

Mary Catholic newspapers, too have protested against the Communist-inspired Sunday labor.
