

\$110,000 in Victory Bonds, Record Made at Nazareth

Students, parents and friends of Nazareth Academy, Rochester, have purchased a grand total of \$110,000 in Victory Bonds up to Dec. 1, it is reported at the Academy today.

This amount surpasses all previous drives at the Academy even the Sixth War Loan when a total of \$62,000 was amassed. The \$50,000 quota for the school for the Victory Loan campaign has been more than doubled. The sum has been made possible, it is stated, at the academy by the individual heroisms working as units under the leadership of a home-room bond seller.

The senior class took the lead with the "magnificent total" of \$63,607.50. Room 211 under the leadership of Betty Bauer attained first place for Bond and Stamp sales, while Room 209 excelled with the Bond sales totaling over \$49,000. Rooms 206, 208, 210 and 201 all passed their quotas with a large surplus.

Room 216, with Lois Hasenauer as leader, holds second place. With the enthusiastic support of Rooms 312, 217, 218 and 319, the Sophomores pressed the Seniors for top honors.

Junior homeroom 114 was high scorer for the Junior class bringing in over \$10,000 and was backed by rooms 306, 304, 301 and 302 which groups passed their quotas.

Third place in the contest was won by Freshman homeroom 105 under the management of Carol

Heininger. Supported by Rooms 111 and 107, this room aided the Freshman class in nearing the \$8,000 quota for the class.

The contestants were spurred in their campaign by the words of Bishop Kearney. "This is of interest to Nazareth, so it is of interest to me," leaders of the campaign staff, Patriotism and school spirit were manifested in raising the amounts needed in United States loans from \$30,000 to \$110,000.

Images to be Illuminated

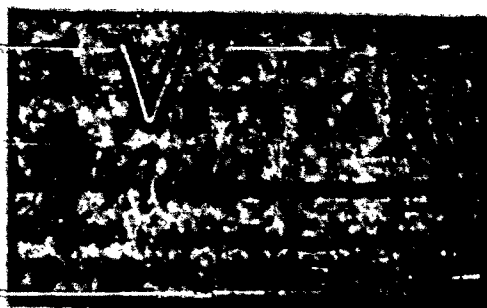

Q.—A reader asks are commissioned officers eligible for receiving out pay?

A.—Commissioned officers below the rank of captain are eligible, others are not.

Q.—The mother of an Army Nurse asks why the mother of a WAC corporal receives a larger monthly allowance from the government than she?

A.—Your daughter is a commissioned officer and therefore she can not obtain for you a family allowance. On the other hand the other girl is a non-commissioned officer and her mother is eligible for a family allowance. The sum you receive comes in its entirety from your daughter's service pay, while the other girl's pay deduction is added to by the government.

Q.—This veteran asks if he may change his National Service Life Insurance to 20 payment life and at a later date again change it back to regular insurance?

A.—Once you have converted your insurance to 20 payment life you may not again change it to term insurance. We have mailed you a booklet on this government insurance for your guidance.

Q.—Another vet asks if it is true that a disabled man who is receiving a pension is not eligible for unemployment payments?

A.—No the pension you receive for your disability has no bearing on your eligibility for unemployment payments.

Q.—This vet asks how can he be arranged for pay deductions in order that his mother might receive a family allowance, he now learns that her claim was disallowed and he asks how to go about recovering this money that was deducted from his service pay?

A.—While giving you full name, Army serial number and date and place of your discharge, also stating all the facts of the case to the Civil Control Administration, War Relocation Office, U. S. Army Central Adjustment Office, 200 West Adams Street, Chicago, Ill.

Cardinal Exhorts Catholics to Vote

Rome — (CIP) — Cardinal Della Costa, Archbishop of Florence, has warned against indifference and abstentionism in political matters and insisted on the absolute duty of every Italian to vote in the coming elections.

"Politics," the Cardinal declared, "is the government of the people, the administration of the State, the necessary science of securing the common good of the many. If the good people abstain from taking part in political life, especially if they do not go to the polls, without any exception, the road will be open to tyranny, violence, intolerance, and dictatorship, and enormous harm will be done to religion, morality, family life, and the entire nation."

Cardinal Della Costa appealed to the clergy to make this clear in sermons and personal explanations. He declared: "Don't be afraid: By preaching and explaining the obligation to vote, we are preaching the Gospel, just as we are preaching the Gospel when we recall the obligation of justice to the employer, obedience to those subject

to orders, beneficence to the rich and charity to all."

Cardinal Della Costa is known to have gone further in this matter than any other Italian Bishop. He recently issued a pastoral letter in which it was made clear that participation in political life "by vote and study" is "an obligation of conscience for all Catholics, men and women, priests and nuns."

Protestants Say Movies Misrepresent Them

Columbia, S. C. — (RNS) — Belief that Protestants are not fairly represented in motion pictures was expressed by the South Carolina Baptist State Convention at its annual sessions here.

"We should insist that the moving picture industry stop leaving the impression that all the decent ministers belong to one church, that all the failures and bad ones come from Protestant groups," the Convention declared.
