

Russia's Stand Perils Peace Says Geneva Priest

Geneva — Danger to peace from attitude and actions of the Russian government was stressed by the Rev. Raymond P. Nolan, principal of DeSalle High School in the main address at the 26th annual banquet honoring past commanders of the Winneck Post, American Legion.

The banquet was held Tuesday, Dec. 11, in the Legion Home. Cemeteries in all parts of the world are "mute evidence of the terrible cost of our victory in World War II," the speaker asserted.

"So many of our fine young American men died for human rights and freedom," Father Nolan said. "Their sacrifice presents to the people of this country the most terrific and startling challenge in the history of the world," he stated.

Speaking on Russia, he said, "It is not as some people have said only the Catholic Church that is harping on the danger from Russia. He pointed out that many columnists and editorialists, those whom we must presume have the greatest access to correct information," have also written of the same danger.

The world according to all the information available to us in the newspapers and other organs of information went to war to save the smaller nations whose names are well known. Father Nolan continued. These same small states have now been surrendered to Russian power, he pointed out.

Father Nolan recalled that the soldiers of this country had refrained from entering and occupying much of Germany, which they could easily have taken in order to keep our part of the agreements made at Yalta and Teheran.

Honor is the same works the same way with nations as it does among individuals, the speaker stated, and "We must see to it that honesty is preserved in the councils of the world" as we inform it among individuals, he said.

Mission Crusaders' \$8542 At Aquinas Sets Record

With a grand total for all mission works of \$8542, the Aquinas Institute Mission Crusade unit has set up a record for 1945 that will again attain national recognition and may not be exceeded by any other Catholic high school in the nation, leaders believe.

The Catholic boys' high school mission workers have reported a total of \$7,865 to the Rev. John S. Randall, diocesan director for the Propagation of the Faith with specific gifts assigned for missionaries in the far-flung corners of the world.

Home and foreign missions such as Bishop Duane G. Hunt's Salt Lake diocese, Bishop Emmett Walsh's North Carolina diocese and Archbishop Matthias mission in India, as well as Bishop Collins in Africa are remembered.

The missions of all the outstanding Religious orders are included. In the Maryknoll gift special mention is made of James Connolly, M.M., a former Aquinas boy. In the Oblate Mission gift, Bernard Brown O.M.I., another former Aquinas boy is listed.

Aquinas Mission Crusaders paid \$200 to send the Rev. Richard Brennan, C.S.S., to his Wall mission post. Father Brennan is an Aquinas alumnus.

Included among the gifts are donations to Chinese, African, Mexican and Indian missions. A special check enrolling the Bastian Fathers at Aquinas in the Society for the Propagation of the Faith was enclosed.

Directing the mission activity at Aquinas is the Rev. Hugh Haffey, C.S.B., vice principal of the school.
