

FOOD FOR THE WAR-STRICKEN



More than 15,000 parishes throughout the nation co-operated in the 'Food for the War-Stricken' campaign, sponsored by War Relief Services-N.C.W.C. Archbishop Francis J. Spellman of New York opened the campaign with an appeal over a nation-wide network. In the picture is shown receiving some of the 29,372 cans of food which 125,000 volunteer workers expect to collect.

26 Schools Turn in 29,372 Cans of Food in Campaign

Twenty-six parish schools of Rochester have piled up 29,372 cans of foodstuffs in the nation-wide campaign for food for the starving peoples of Europe and the Far East, according to reports thus far.

In addition to this total, the Rev. John S. Randall, diocesan director, announced the food collection center set up at 33 Aqueduct street reports a total of 375 cases containing 14,160 cans of food.

This collection includes: 88 cases of milk (4 dozen cans to the case), 120 cases of baby foods, 31 cases of soup, 25 cases of home processed foods and 128 cans of vegetables (2 dozen cans to the case).

Topping the list of contributors in the parish schools is Sacred Heart Pro-Cathedral School with a collection of 4,082 cans. Other parish schools who led in

contributions are Blessed Sacrament with 3,300 cans, St. Margaret Mary, 2,108, Immaculate Conception, 2,100 and Holy Family, 1,781.

A fleet of trucks has been organized to make the collection in the parish centers on Saturday, Dec. 22. The canned goods will be taken directly to railroad sidings where it will be loaded into freight cars and sent to New York immediately.

The diocesan goal of 400,000 cans is included in the national drive for 20,000,000 being conducted by War Relief Services-National Catholic Welfare Conference.

Bp. Hurley at Rome On Way to Belgrade

Vatican City (NC) — The Most Rev. Joseph F. Hurley, Bishop of Saint Augustine, has arrived here by air en route to his post as Regent ad interim of the Apostolic Nunciature in Belgrade, Yugoslavia. He had been appointed to this position last October by His Holiness Pope Pius XII.

Through the appointment of Bishop Hurley as Regent ad interim, it was said at the Vatican, "the Holy See is afforded the possibility of placing itself in clear contact with the actual religious conditions prevailing in Yugoslavia and of resuming normal contacts with the Yugoslav hierarchy."

The "light" hope was expressed at the Vatican in announcing Bishop Hurley's appointment, that from the fulfillment of his mission, "whether with the civil authorities or with the Episcopate, there can be derived notable advantages for Catholic life in harmony with the teachings and century-old traditions of the Church."

Bishop Hurley, who has a distinguished record in the diplomatic service of the Holy See, was secretary to Archbishop Edward Mooney of Detroit during the latter's service as Apostolic Delegate to India from 1928 to 1931, and to Japan from 1931 to

1933. From 1934 to 1940 he was an attache of the Papal Secretariate of State at the Vatican. He assumed his post as Bishop of Saint Augustine in 1940.

Bishop Hurley's appointment as Regent does not affect his position as Bishop of Saint Augustine.

Poetry Contest Honoring Blessed Virgin Resumed

Paris — (NC) — An ancient custom dating back to the XV century and perpetuated throughout the years save for rare in-

terruptions caused by the revolution and the war will be resumed in December in the city of Rouen. It is a poetry contest in honor of the Blessed Virgin in which competitors must write a poem devoted to her glorification.

The names of the laureates will be announced during a solemn festivity presided over by the Archbishop of Rouen. Some of France's greatest poets, including Villon, Corneille and Verlaine, have taken part in the contest.
