Chaplain Heindl To Get Mass Kit As Danville Gift

Danville — A Mass kit which he received from the people of St. Mary's Church, Danville, will enable Chaplain Elmer W. Heindl, former assistant pastor here, to purchase a new Mass kit replacing Field Mass kit used and strained by his 41 months front line service in the South-west Pacific.

Chaplain Heindl returned to his old parish Sunday where he celebrated Mass and gave Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. In the sermon, the chaplain spoke of the great power of prayer in achieving victory.

At a reception held in the K. of C. Hall from 7 until 8 p. m., the former assistant was presented with a purse in token of appreciation for his work there.

He spoke briefly of his experiences and mentioned gratefully the prayers and letters received from Danville friends. Expressing his thanks for the gift he said his intention of buying a new Mass kit which he would dedicate to St. Mary's.

Mrs. Doris W. Fuller, of St. Mary's, welcomed him and reviewed Father Heindl's scholarly work and record. A group of men of the parish school at a reception at the school.
