Any article of clothing in serviceable condition that can be worn by man, woman or child, will be acceptable. The packing center for the collection for both Auburn and Cayuga County will be at 64 Centre Street, the old

T. M. C. A. Building.

All donations may be delivered to the centers which will be open during the collection from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m. Monday to Friday and on Saturday from 9 a. m. to noon.

## Holy Name Men To Rally At 4 Churches Jan. 20

Sponsored by the Rochester Diocesan Holy Name Union, District Holy Name Rallies will be held in four Rochester churches on Sunday, Jan. 20, in observance of the Feast of the Holy Name. Parishes outside the See City have been requested to hold similar observances by the Diocesan Union of Clergy.

With a former Chaplain of the armed forces as speaker, the rally in each of the four district churches will be held at 3:30 p. m. Speakers will be announced in next week's *Courier Journal*.

The district churches are: District No. 1, Our Lady of Perpetual Help, 1035 Joseph Ave.; District No. 2, Holy Rosary Church, 414 Lexington Ave.; District No. 3, Corpus Christi Church, 200 Main St. East and District No. 4, St. Peter and Paul's Church, 720 Main St. West. Services will consist of the Litany of the Holy Name, the sermon by the Service Chaplain, Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament and recitation of the Holy Name pledge.

The Rally plans are being directed by the Diocesan Union of Clergy and the notices are signed by the Rev. F. William Stauffer, spiritual director; John W. Mathe, president, and Frank R. Davis, secretary.

## Diocese Collects 138 Tons of Food For War-Stricken

Diocesan churches and organizations collected 228,328 cans of food weighing more than 138 tons in the recent nationally sponsored drive for the war-stricken Europe and the Far East, the Rev. John S. Randall, diocesan director, reports.

Cooperating with War Relief Services, National Catholic Welfare Conference, Rochester launched its one-week drive Dec. 9 to help feed the millions of starving people in the two war-devastated areas.

Cases of food collected in the parish centers and at the campaign depot, 33 Aqueduct Street, were shipped with all possible speed to New York City, where they were loaded aboard ship immediately.

In the city of Rochester alone, according to Father Randall's report, 105,902 cans of food were donated to the drive. Out of city centers collected 123,487 cans.

To the out of town total, Auburn contributed 7,547 cans, Geneva, 8,563, Corning, 6,361 and Elmira, 23,037.

The diocesan collection averaged over a pound of food to the can, the total weight amounting to 276,574 pounds.

Lt. Buffone trained at Sampson and later was stationed at the Naval Hospital, Quantico, Va. While overseas, she was at the Navy No. 128 Hospital, at Pearl Harbor and at the Old Naval Dispensary, Honolulu, Hawaii.

Her sister, Helen, is a corporal in the Women's Army Corps, at Norfolk, Va., two brothers are in the Army, Frederick, a master sergeant soon to be discharged, and Vincent, a sergeant, at Cherry Point, N. C. A third brother, Ralph, is a motor machinist's mate 2/c, aboard the U. S. S. *Henrico*.

They are all children of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Buffone, and their family home is on Clark St. They all attended St. Mary's School and Watertown High School.

## Campaign Opens Feb. 7 With Dinner at Rochester

The Most Rev. Walter A. Foery, Bishop of Syracuse, will keynote the \$500,000 drive for a new St. Andrew's Preparatory Seminary on Thursday, February 7, at the opening dinner for all diocesan campaign workers in Rochester's Chamber of Commerce.

An alumnus of St. Andrew's, Bishop Foery accepted an invitation offered by Bishop James E. Kearney of Rochester, honorary chairman of the drive which will extend through February 22.

Clergy and laity from every parish in the Diocese are expected at the February 7 dinner. Indications are that large delegations will be on hand from parishes in the Geneva, Auburn, Corning and Elmira Deaneries as well as the Rochester area.

The Syracuse Bishop was graduated from St. Andrew's in 1910 and ordained to the priesthood following completion of his studies at St. Bernard's in June, 1916. He held pastorates at Mount Carmel and Holy Rosary Church in Rochester and served as director of Rochester Catholic Charities before his elevation to Ordinary of the Syracuse See.

Harold J. Coleman, general chairman of the campaign announced this week that organization plans for the drive are well under way. Workers are being recruited in the various parishes to help raise the quotas assigned to such parishes.

The Diocese has been divided into zones for campaign purposes and priests and laymen have been named in charge of the various zones. General campaign plans are in charge of an Advisory Committee comprising: Rt. Rev. Mgr. William F. Bergan, Rt. Rev. Mgr. John F. Goggin, Rev. Francis W. Luddy, Rev. Edward Lyons, Rev. Walter Kohl, Rev. Dr. Charles J. Mahoney and Rev. John S. Randall.
