Quill and Walter Winters. Both returned to duty on December 30th. Quill entered the service on March 31, 1941, and Winters on November 23, 1943.

Double Rites Held For Cowmeyer Sisters, Victims of Auto

Auburn — Miss Mary J. Cowmeyer and Miss Ann F. Cowmeyer, sisters of 22 Pleasant Street, were killed almost instantly Saturday, Dec. 28, when struck by an automobile as they were walking to St. Mary's Church, police reported here. The accident occurred in front of St. Mary's Convent, at the corner of James and Clark Streets.

The Cowmeyer sisters were born in Ireland and were daughters of the late William and Margaret Cowmeyer. They had lived in Auburn since they were children and attended St. Mary's School. Both were communicants of St. Mary's Church and members of the Rosary and Scapular Society of that parish. Their only survivors were a sister, Miss Johanna Cowmeyer of Pleasant Street; a niece, Marion Cowmeyer Murphy and a nephew, William Cowmeyer.

Funeral services were held at St. Mary's Church on Wednesday morning, Jan. 2, 1946, where a Solemn High Mass of Requiem was offered by Rev. Dennis Hickey with Rev. Leo McManus as deacon and Rev. Dr. William E. Cowen as sub-deacon. Burial was in St. Joseph's Cemetery where Doctor Cowen read the service assisted by Father McManus and Father John White.
