

### Rochester Leader Paid K. C. Chapter Tribute

The work of the late Dr. Walter B. O'Neill for the Central New York Chapter Knights of Columbus, will be commemorated on a plaque to be placed in the K. of C. clubrooms, Columbus Civic Centre, it was announced Sunday at the chapter's Rochester meeting.

Representing 6,000 Knights of Columbus and 22 councils, the chapter delegates met in Columbus Civic Centre, Rochester, for their quarterly gathering to discuss mutual problems. The knights were urged to leave their councils during February, Catholic Press Month, and to lend their support to lay retreats and the Holy Name Society.

Highlighting the meeting was the memorial to Dr. O'Neill who had served as chapter chairman in 1939 and had for many years been a delegate to the chapter.

Chairman Thomas Christian, presiding, announced the presentation of a plaque to Rochester Council and acceptance was voiced by Grand Knight Francis T. Toomey of Rochester.

Attending the memorial service were Mrs. Walter B. O'Neill and her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. John O'Brien.

A letter from Joseph M. Foley, state deputy, of New York, declared that Dr. O'Neill's efforts had been the finest type of Catholic lay apostolate.

Representing past chapter chairman was James F. Langan of Fulton. Speaking for Rochester Council were: the Rev. William J. Schifferl, chaplain; Master Cyril J. Start of the Fourth Degree; Dr. Joseph P. Henry, and Chapter Warden Rocco F. Natale. George W. Varney spoke for the state council.

Other chaplains in attendance were the Rev. James D. Cuffney and the Rev. Gerard J. Geffell of Newark.

A dinner for the visiting officers and delegates was served following the meeting in the K. of C. Clubrooms. Chapter Warden Natale was chairman and Charles G. McMahon was vice chairman.

### 5,587 Breakfasts Served In NCCS-KC Canteen in '45

Breakfasts were served to 5,587 servicemen, principally from Sampson Naval Center, during 1945, according to the annual report of the N.C.C.S.-U.S.C. Canteen in Columbus Civic Centre.

Handling the work in the Knights of Columbus clubrooms on the second floor, and in the third-floor dormitory were 3,253 volunteer workers from various diocesan organizations and other groups.

Largest number of men were guests of the canteen during the month of April when 821 breakfasts were served, the report shows. The month of July with a total of 900 breakfasts runs a close second and 579 were served during August.

A total of 10,083 hours were put in by the workers in the canteen and dormitory as well as on the entertainment program which was handled by 112 volunteers.

Expressing his appreciation for the work of the volunteers, the Rev. John S. Randall, diocesan

chairman of the N.C.C.S., stated: "We are grateful to the organizations throughout the diocese who have given such willing and efficient help in the canteen and dormitory during the past year. There is still, however, a need for volunteers as the diocesan N.C.C.S. program will continue to operate so long as Sampson Naval Center remains open."
