way of Newfoundland, and Foynea, Ireland.

On his return to Detroit Archbishop Mooney will hold immediately a Te Deum service of thanksgiving in his Blessed Sacrament Cathedral. A civic reception is also tentatively set for some time during the week of his homecoming.

Two other men who once served as secretaries to Archbishop Mooney will be in Rome for the ceremonies next month. It was learned from Father Casey. One is Bishop Joseph Hurley, now on a special Papal mission in Belgrade, Yugoslavia, and the Rev. John Donovan, of Detroit, who is studying Canon Law in Rome.

Father Casey added that another member of the official party is Bishop Michael J. Ready of Columbus, Ohio, and an alumnus of St. Bernard's Seminary. Native of Rochester, Father Casey is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph L. Casey, 347 Monroe Ave. He is a graduate of St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's seminaries and was ordained to the priesthood June 6, 1930.

His first assignment was as assistant pastor at Old St. Mary's Church here. In 1932 the late Bishop O'Hara named him vice-chancellor of the diocese. After that he became secretary to Archbishop Mooney and then Bishop Kearney. For 12 years he has served as chaplain at the Monroe County Jail and until recently was an instructor in religion at Our Lady of Mercy High.

All four of the American Cardinals-elect plan to cross the Atlantic Ocean by air to receive their Red Hats in Vatican City at the February Consistory. It will mark the first time in ecclesiastical history that prelates have flown to a Consistory.

Archbishop John J. Glendon, of St. Louis, and Archbishop Francis J. Spellman, of New York, with their parties, will fly to Rome in one plane leaving this country about February 12. It has been announced.

The swift passage which the four Cardinals-elect will have to the Eternal City recalls the trying but fruitless dash which the late Cardinal William O'Connell, Archbishop of Boston, made in January 1922 when—after the death of Pope Benedict XV—he sought to get to Rome in time to participate in the election of his successor. Employing the quickest means of travel available, Cardinal O'Connell still failed to arrive at the Consistory until after the election of Pope Pius XI.

As this was his second experience of the kind, Cardinal O'Connell pointed out to the newly-elected Pius XI that, despite the greatest speed they could then make in travel, it looked as if American Cardinals could not get to Rome soon enough after the death of a Pope to participate in the election of his successor. The first official document issued in the Pontificate of Pope Pius XI extended from 10 to 15 days the time that might elapse between the death of one Pope and the inauguration of the Conclave to choose the next.
