Holy Name Men To Gather at Four Churches

Two Army and two Navy veteran chaplains will be the speakers at four Holy Name Society rallies, Sunday, Jan. 21, in four district churches at 8:30 p. m., services sponsored by the Rochester Diocese Holy Name Union in the Rochester diocese.

A veteran Army chaplain will speak at the rally in St. Ann's Church, Hornell, for 63 Catholic laymen of that city.

Services in thanksgiving to Almighty God for the termination of the war will take place in these district churches: District No. 1, Our Lady of Fervent Help Church, speaker, the Rev. Thomas Manley; District No. 2, Holy Rosary Church, speaker, the Rev. Francis J. Fogarty; District No. 3, Corpus Christi Church, Rev. Elmer W. Heindl (still active as chaplain); District No. 4, St. Peter and Paul's, the Rev. Bernard C. Hanna.

Suggested services include: organ music 8:15 to 8:30; National Anthem; Opening Hymn, "Sweet Name Which Makes the Dying Live" (all men to stand and join in singing); Litany of the Holy Name of Jesus; Sermon; Solemn Remembrance of the Blessed Sacrament; Divine Prayers; Hymn, "Holy God We Praise Thy Name."

The four priests invited to address the rallies are all World War veterans. Father Manley served in the European theater, Father Fogarty was aboard the USS *Bellevue* Wood in the Pacific, Father Heindl is home on furlough now from dangerous service in the Pacific campaign and Father Hanna served in Panama and the Mediterranean.

Speaker at St. Ann's, Hornell, for many of that parish and St. Ignace Loyola will be the Rev. John J. Maloney, paratroop chaplain veteran now stationed in Burma.

FIRE DESTROYS AUBURN HOME OF POLISH FALCONS

Auburn — The clubrooms and home of Auburn Polish Falcons of America at 71 Pulaski Street, was destroyed by fire on Saturday. The loss is estimated at between \$65,000 and \$75,000.

The fire commenced in the gymnasium on the second floor. The front of the Falcon Building was constructed in 1908 and the gymnasium in 1919 and the bowling alleys in 1937.

On the night previous to the fire the trustees of the organization held a meeting at which plans for the observance of the 40th anniversary of the society were discussed. Because of the fire, the annual Communion Breakfast of the Holy Name Society of St. Hyacinth's Church was postponed, and bowling matches held Monday evenings will be discontinued until further notice.

Church Unity Octave Lists Five Bishops

Washington — (NC) — Five bishops, including two from sees outside the United States, will take part in the Church Unity Octave ceremonies to be held at the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception here.

Bishop John M. McNamara, Auxiliary of Baltimore and of Washington, will preside at the opening service on January 18, and Bishop Lawrence J. Shehan, also Auxiliary of Baltimore and of Washington, will officiate at the concluding ceremonies on January 23.

Bishop Ambrose Senyshyn, O.S.B.M., Auxiliary of the Ukrainian Catholic Diocese of the United States; Bishop Louis L. R. Morrow of Krishnagar, India, and Bishop Arsene Turquetil, O.M.I., Titular Bishop of Proterias and former Vicar Apostolic of Hudson Bay, will also participate.

Maurice Baring, Convert, Author Dies in Scotland

Beauty, Scotland — (NC) — Maurice Baring, widely-known English author, who died here at the age of 71, was a convert to Catholicism, having been received into the Church in 1909.

Mr. Baring, partly paralyzed and bedridden for the last three years, was the son of Lord Revelstoke, a London banker. His literary reputation is based on more than fifty published works, including poetry, novels, plays, biography, literary criticism, and editorial essays.

The American party split into two groups. The first met the Catholic Social Sisters at their convent and accompanied by them visited the chief squares of the city in which Christmas trees had been placed. At each they presented the children with gifts and candy.

The second group worked as a "task force" travelling with the sisters on trucks, each of which mounted a Christmas tree. The trucks went through the city, heading for the poorer districts.

Vatican Prepares For Consistory

Vatican City — (NC) — All departments of the Vatican are busily engaged in preparing for the Consistory next month at which 33 new Cardinals will be solemnly invested as members of the Senate of the Church. The Secret Consistory is scheduled to take place on February 18 in the Consistorial Hall and a Public Consistory on February 21, probably in the Sistine Chapel.

The Secret Consistory will be attended only by the Pope and the Cardinals, while Bishops, Apostolic Protonotaries and other prelates are admitted to the Public Consistory.

Many details regarding vestments for the New Cardinals and their reception and accommodation at the Eternal City are now being worked out. In most cases, it is expected, the national houses of the Cardinals will offer them hospitality.
