5000 DIOCESAN WORKERS AWAIT SEMINARY DRIVE OPENING FEB. 7

A diocesan campaign force of more than 5000 members of the clergy and laity has been lined up for the forthcoming \$500,000 drive to build a new St. Andrew's Seminary.

This estimate was given this week by the Rev. John S. Randall, campaign manager, as plans were completed for the opening dinner in the Rochester Chamber of Commerce on Thursday evening, Feb. 7.

Bishop James E. Kearney of Rochester and Bishop Walter A. Foery of Syracuse will speak at the opening dinner at which Harold J. Coleman, general chairman, will preside. The campaign will extend through Feb. 22.

Aquinas to Lease Former Public School as Annex

Rochester's Board of Education will lease old School 40, LaGrange Ave. to Aquinas Institute for the rental of \$250 a month, the Board voted this week. The school with two other public school buildings was closed last year as an economy measure.

Old School 40 will be used by the Basilian Fathers, in charge of Aquinas for a freshmen annex. Officials of Aquinas Institute had offered \$275 per month on the condition that heating and plumbing apparatus be in good shape.

Repairs will be started to make possible the use of Old School 40 for special classes in the spring. It is not expected that regular freshmen classes will be conducted in the building before next fall.

When the Board of Education learned from Mayor Samuel B. Dicker that the former public school building would not be required for emergency housing, the Board voted to lease the building to the Catholic boys high school. The vote was unanimous.

This action solved the problem involving Eastman Kodak Company, the Zoning Board of Appeals, the City Planning Commission and the Mayor's Advisory Committee on Housing.

Mrs. Rachel Lee, commissioner, who had moved on Dec. 13 to lease the building to Eastman Kodak Company for a film educational project, moved the second resolution for making the building available to Aquinas. The Zoning Board of Appeals and the Planning Commission had ruled out occupancy by Kodak, the first bidder.

Expressing relief over the settlement, the Rev. William J. Duggan, C.S.P., secretary of Aquinas Board of Directors and principal stated that 400 freshmen are expected in the fall and the public school building will ease a space shortage at the Dewey Ave. School.

Bishop to Dedicate Girls' Center Sunday

Young women of St. Francis of Assisi Parish, Orange St., are busy putting the finishing touches on the new Girls' Center which will be formally dedicated by His Excellency, Most Rev. James E. Kearney, next Sunday at 4:30 P. M. The parish will then be provided with two centers for young people, a Boys' Center located at 73 Whitney St. having been dedicated March 9, 1941 by Bishop Kearney with Father Flanagan of Boys' Town as guest speaker.

The Girls' Center will be located in what was formerly a private home at 401 Orange St. It has been completely renovated and redecorated. It contains a lounge and music room for parties and meetings of girls' clubs and women's organizations, a fully equipped and modern kitchen for cooking classes which will be under the direction of Miss Irene Munitz of the Rochester Gas and Electric Corp., a library, a sewing room for classes in dressmaking and tailoring, and another small meeting room. The sewing room was equipped by the Hickey-Freeman Clothing Co.

The purpose of the center is to advance the physical, intel-

tual, cultural, economic, moral and spiritual welfare of the girls and young women of the neighborhood. Its facilities will be open to all.

It is planned to institute classes in grammar and choral singing in the near future. Lectures on health and hygiene, on child care, on the problems of youth and married people are also planned.

A full time secretary and receptionist, Miss Theresa Munn, formerly receptionist at the Madison Street Dispensary will be in charge of activities.

The dedication will begin with services in St. Francis Assisi Church at which Bishop Kearney will speak, followed by procession to the Center for the blessing and dedication, after which members of the parish and guests will be shown through the Center.

Among the guests who are expected for the ceremony are Jeremiah Hickey, Harold W. Rauber and Paul Brescia, all of the Hickey-Freeman Clothing Co., and Christopher H. D'Amanna, prominent attorney.
