

Labor Problem Discussion Set at Hospitality House

Current labor problems will be discussed by William Gaffney, investigator for the State Department of Labor, at a lecture Tuesday, Jan. 29 at 8:30 p. m. in St. Joseph's House of Hospitality. Subject will be "State Minimum Wage Law."

Contributions amounting to \$500 were received at the House of Hospitality for the feeding of homeless men during the Christmas season, the Rev. George Vogt, director, announced.

About 100 men were guests at the Christmas turkey dinner served by the men and women of the Catholic Workers' group.

There is an urgent need for men's clothing and shoes in addition to the continued need for food, Father Vogt reports. The House is also asking for dona-

tions of food or money for packages to go to the destitute in Europe. These will be accepted at the House, 46 1/2 South Avenue.

Interned Mission Nurses Back at China Posts

St. Columban, Neb. — (NC) — Loreto Sisters who were interned in Shanghai by the Japanese during the war have returned to their mission stations in Hanyang, according to word received here.

Some of the Sisters went by train to Nanking and then by boat to Hanyang, but others managed to get a place on a transport that was going up the Yangtze river with supplies, braving the floating mines that made a river trip perilous.

Work for Peace in Own Lives First, Verein Members Told

Rochester branches, Catholic Central Verein of America, and National Catholic Women's Union, at a joint meeting held last Sunday afternoon, heard the Rev. Jerome Schifferli of St. Michael's Church explain the first two parts of "The Will for Peace," the declaration adopted by the two organizations at their meeting held last August in Wisconsin. These two parts are entitled "The Will for Peace" and "Victory Over Hate."

Father Schifferli defined peace as the tranquility of order and said that the most effective way for individuals to bring about peace was to establish tranquil-

ity based upon order. God at the head in their own lives, in their family lives, and in their relations with their fellowmen. He also urged the members to make themselves vocal concerning the principles which they studied in their meetings.

In the discussion which followed Father Schifferli's remarks, Oliver Waczenas, Louis Ammering, Anthony Heilig, Joseph H. Gervais and August M. Maier took part.

The nominating committee presented a slate of candidates for the offices to be filled at the February meeting. Plans were discussed for a card party to be held in February.

Joseph H. Gervais, chairman of the Credit Union Committee reported that the annual statements of the 4 parish credit unions showed the credit unions to be in a flourishing condition, that the largest was Holy Family Parish Credit Union which had \$143,000 of assets and had in the less than 9 years of its existence, made over \$599,000 of personal loans without losing one penny of the money lent.

The delegates and members of the 2 organizations attended Mass at Holy Redeemer Church on Sunday morning in memory of Rev. Jacob Staub. Following the Mass, Rev. F. William Stauder, pastor of Holy Redeemer Church, complimented the men and women on keeping alive for almost 25 years, the memory of their deceased leader.

He also said that conditions today were, if anything, more disturbed than in Father Stauder's time and consequently such organizations as the Central Verein were needed very badly. He urged them to continue to expand their work. Father Stauder also paid glowing tribute to the late Former County Judge Phillip H. Donnelly for the untiring zeal he had manifested in his work with the Catholic Central Verein.

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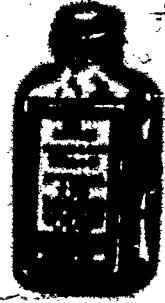
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Carolina Court Refuses To Recognize Divorce
