### INTERNED PRIEST 'HAPPY'

#### Missionary in Japanese Camp Danced to Keep Himself Warm

St. Columbans, Neb. — If you can keep your sense of humor, even four years in a Japanese jail won't hurt you—much! At least that is the prescription followed by Father Patrick Dawson, Columban missionary who recently returned from Korea where he spent the last four years in jail.

Says Father Dawson: "I was sentenced to five years in jail, two and a half years at hard labor and the remainder at normal confinement. In spite of the seriousness of the situation, I used to laugh when a guard came up to me and said with a pucker face: 'You must be a bishop to get such a big sentence!'"

"In jail," continued the missionary, "I amused myself by singing Irish tunes and jiggling to keep warm. The jailers were very amused at this, and pointed me out as a shining example of the happy jailbird. They wanted to know why everyone else couldn't be as happy as I. If they only knew the hollow, empty feeling in my stomach, they wouldn't think I was so happy."

Father Dawson was released from jail shortly after the peace was declared. "On August 18,

1945," he remarked, "I said my first Mass in three years and nine months. It was my birthday."

### Private Aid Units Urged for Reich

Washington — (NC) — Members of the National Catholic Women's Union are urged in a letter by Mrs. Mary Filser Lohr, president of the organization, to contact their Congressmen and ask them "to use their influence in order that private relief organizations may start operations in Germany."

Referring to the many reports depicting suffering of the civilian population in former enemy countries, Mrs. Filser Lohr says: "It is our grave responsibility to aid such a heart-rending appeal for the sake of suffering humanity. It is our privilege at the eleventh hour to give a helping hand to the needy and oppressed people of Europe who have weathered the storm but cannot continue unless we come to their aid."

The problem of revising present restricting regulations is now under review by the War Department, the Department of State and the President's War Relief Control Board, according to a letter from the Adjutant General's office to the Board of Directors, National Council of Catholic Women.

### Holy Father Assists Czech War Victims

Prague — Caritas, Czechoslovak Catholic welfare organization, has received a considerable sum of money from His Holiness Pope Pius XII toward alleviating the needs of victims of the war and the damage wrought to the Church by Nazi persecution.

In accordance with the wish of the Holy Father the money will be distributed in the different dioceses proportionate to the damage they have suffered during the war.

### Women Give War Needy 300 Tons of Clothing

Madrid — (LINE) — Three hundred tons of clothing donated by women members of Spanish Catholic Action have been shipped from Barcelona for war-victims, representing Magt. General Clognani, Papal Nuncio to Spain, will superintend distribution on behalf of the Vatican relief commission.

### 'Leafleteers' Are Organized

New York (NC) — A Jesuit priest with a strong belief in the power of words in print — when they're brief and to the point — is rallying a group of Catholics whom he calls "The Leafleteers" to counteract efforts of enemies of the Church who have flooded America with anti-Catholic tracts and booklets.

With 11,000,000 of his leaflets already in circulation, the Rev. Edward F. Garrache, S.J., of the Vista Maria Press, believes that this figure can be multiplied five

or ten fold, greatly increasing correct knowledge of the Church's doctrine. If Catholic laymen can be persuaded to give a few of their non-Catholic friends or leave them in public places.
