

5000 DIOCESAN WORKERS AWAIT SEMINARY DRIVE OPENING FEB. 7

A diocesan campaign force of more than 5,000 members of the clergy and laity has been lined up for the forthcoming \$500,000 drive to build a new St. Andrew's Seminary.

This estimate was given this week by the Rev. John S. Randall, campaign manager, as plans were completed for the opening dinner in the Rochester Chamber of Commerce on Thursday evening, Feb. 7.

Bishop James E. Kearney of Rochester and Bishop Walter A. Foery of Syracuse will speak at the opening dinner at which Harold J. Coleman, general chairman, will preside. The campaign will extend through Feb. 22.

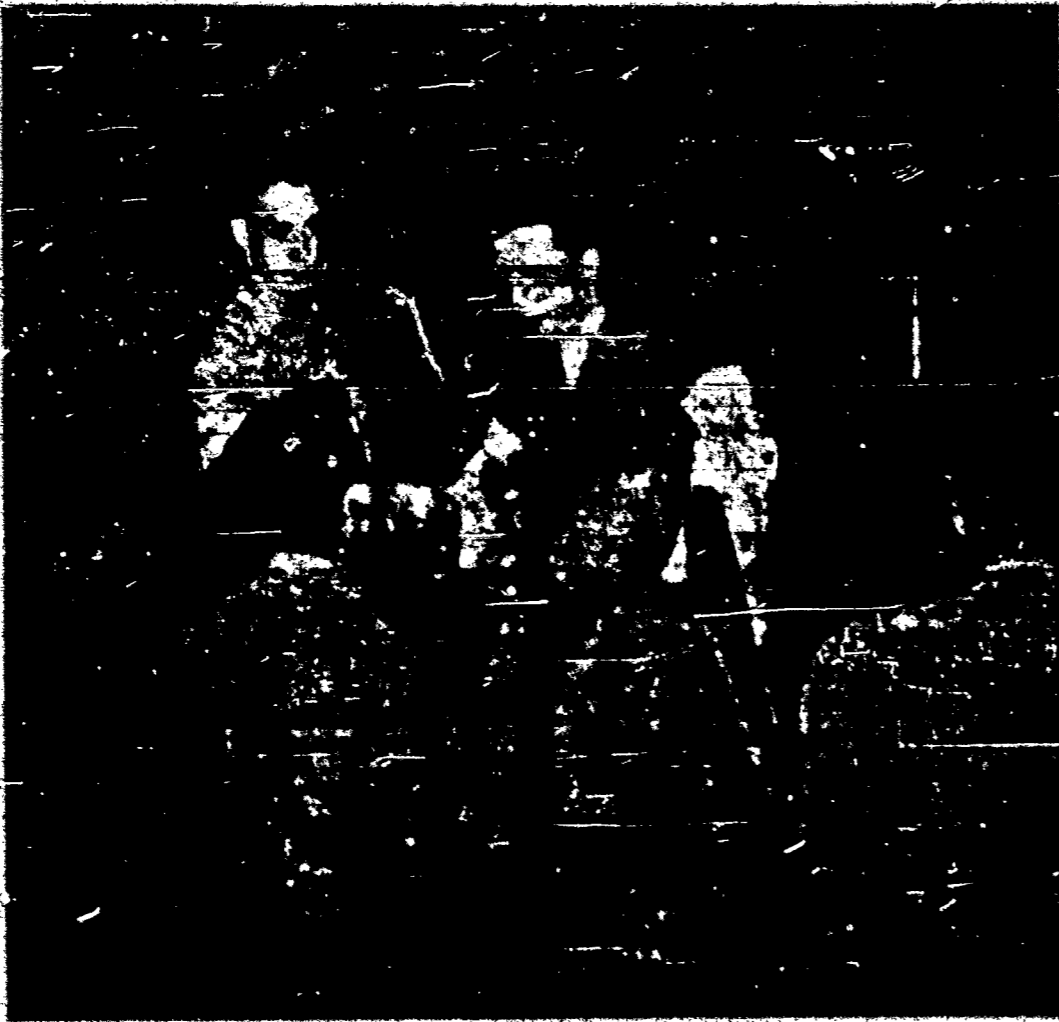

Calls Holy Name Men To Defend Democracy

Harnell—Democracy and its true meaning was the subject of an address by Captain John S. Maloney, former paratroop chaplain, at a largely attended rally of Holy Name men from St. Ann's and St. Ignace Loyola parishes held Sunday afternoon in St. Ann's Church.

Father Maloney is assistant pastor of St. Patrick's Church, Elmira.

"Sluggish of both World War I and World War II have been similar," said Father Maloney. "In World War I, we fought to make the world safe for democracy. World War II was a struggle between totalitarianism and democracy."

Defining democracy, the veteran chaplain pointed out: "Many people believe that democracy constitutes the rule of the majority. This idea does not coincide with those of our founding fathers. Some principles, such as the inalienable rights of man referred to in the Constitution are self-evident regardless of the rulings of the majority."

"Individual rights of man come from God, and only God can take them away," he asserted.

"It is a true democracy the rights of man which are guaranteed by God are protected by a government put into existence for the purpose of safeguarding the rights of the individual."

"To protect these rights, our forefathers formulated the Bill of Rights."

"No matter how much standards change in the world today, traditional standards of right
