CAPITOL

"AND THEN THERE WERE NONE" (x) (20th Century Fox). Taking Agatha Christie's mystery tale "The Little Death," based on the "Inhalative process described in the famous nursery rhyme, French director René Clément turns out a better than average "who-dunit" film. A party of strangers, invited to a mysterious island home, fail to locate their host who, by phonograph record, accuses them of various crimes and threatens punishment. They begin to die off strictly according to the circumstances described. In the rhyme until, when only three survive, the mystery is solved, just—and barely just—in time to avoid asylums.

The first two-thirds of the story is suspenseful and strange. Realistic, after which the eventual solution is "telegraphed" to keen detective fans. Topnotch cast includes Barry Fitzgerald, Louis Hayward, Jane Darwell, Isobel Elsom, Sir C. Aubrey Smith, Roland Young, Walter Huston, Mischa Auer, Richard Haydn and Queenie Leonard.

3 Scholarships Totalling \$3,600 Offered by College

Three scholarships valued at \$1,000 and a limited number of \$400 scholarships are being offered this year by the College of New Rochelle.

Available to both Catholic High School girls and Catholic girls in public high schools, these scholarships include: one St. Augustine Scholarship of \$1,400-\$350 a year; one Athletic Association Scholarship of \$1,400-\$350 a year and one Art Scholarship of \$300-\$200 a year.

The Art Scholarship is open to students majoring in art who must submit a special project with application.

These scholarships and the \$400 St. Angela Scholarships, which pay \$100 a year, will be awarded on the basis of a competitive examination which will be held in Rochester at the Academy of the Sacred Heart, 8 Prince Street.

Those students who meet the entrance requirements of New Rochelle, are in the upper tenth of their classes and have an average of 85 percent are eligible.

Admission will be fifty cents plus ten cents tax proceeds to go for improvements in the hall. A variety of table prizes will be available.
