

SCHOLARSHIP EXAM SET BY COLLEGE

The annual competitive examination for scholarships to Good Counsel College, White Plains, N. Y., will be held Saturday, Mar. 23, from 1 to 4 p. m. at the College.

Students in this area may make arrangements through their principals to take the examination in their own schools.

These scholarships which are offered to girls graduating from approved high schools in June, 1946, are awarded on the basis of a comprehensive examination in English, a psychological examination and the High School record and recommendation of the principal.

All applications and school records must be received at the college not later than Feb. 28. Application blanks may be procured by writing to the Committee on Scholarships, Good Counsel College, White Plains, N. Y.

Enrollment Sets Record

Chicago — (NC) — With a record-breaking enrollment of 204,182 students in its 465 grade schools, 90 high schools and eight colleges, the Chicago archdiocesan school system began its second century of work during the 1944-45 school year, according to the report of Mgr. Daniel F. Cunningham, Archdiocesan Superintendent of Schools.

The enrollment represented an increase of 9,056 students over that of the previous period, when an increase of 4,489 was recorded.

Pontiff Counsels Employers, Workers at Vatican Audience

Rome — (RNS) — Unusual importance was attached here to an audience given by Pope Pius XII to fifty-six representatives of Italian electrical companies and their employees who are in Rome to confer on a new national industry-labor contract.

Stressing the spirit of cooperation "which must exist between employers and workers" the Pope reminded the industrialists of their social responsibility, and told the workers that the struggle to defend their interests should be conducted in a legal manner.

"These interests," Pope Pius said, "cannot be safeguarded by means of the fallacious ideology of collectivism, which does not solve social problems, since it means changing private capitalism into state capitalism."

155 British Servicemen Enter Jesuit Seminary

London — (NC) — A total of 126 servicemen of all ranks, veterans of many campaigns, prisoners of war and seamen, have been accepted at Campion House, Osterley, Middlesex, near London, the Jesuit house of studies for late vocations. Of these 55 are already in residence and the rest will move in within the next few months.

Father Ziemak will bring students to demonstrate his new methods of teaching the strings to high school students.
