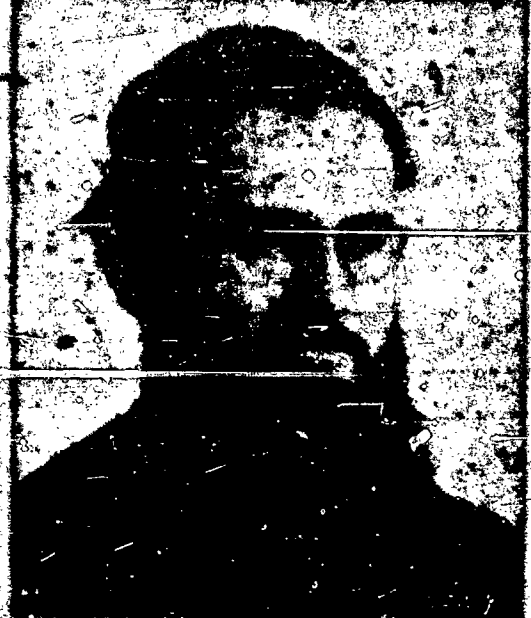

Gls Find Russian Priest from U. S.

New York — Father Maurice Meyers, S.J., is known to Amer- ican troops in Shanghai, China, as the "Russian priest with the Hoosier accent."
 A native of Fort Wayne, In- diana, Father Meyers is kept busy explaining to G. I.'s that his long black beard and Russian robe is not a disguise. He actual- ly belongs to the Russian Rite. Since the beginning of the war he has been working, with two other Jesuits, among the large Russian population of Shanghai.
 "We entered this work," says Father Meyers, "with our eye on Russia and our hopes high to contribute to making Russia once more a member of the family of Christian nations. Our Shanghai work is a practical preparation for ourselves both in the lan- guage and the psychology of the people."

Scarlet Birettas Given
 The next ceremony is the im- position of the scarlet biretta up- on the new Cardinals. It will take place in the Great Hall of Benedictine above the grand por- tico of St. Peter's. Instead of one of the halls of the Papal apart- ment, where it was formerly held.
 Thursday, February 21, will bring the climax of the cere- monies. In the Basilica of St. Peter, at a public Consistory, the Supreme Pontiff will confer the Red Hats on the new Cardinals. No more stirring and beautiful setting can be imagined for the ceremony than this monumental edifice, surmounted by Michel- angelo's cupola as by a gorgeous crown.
 After pronouncing their oaths of allegiance and fidelity to the Vicar of the Blessed Sacrament, the new Cardinals will precede the Holy Father as he is carried on the Sedia Gestatoria to the Papal Throne, erected directly be- fore the Papal Altar in the central nave of the Basilica. It is there that the Red Hats are given to the new Princes of the Church. Also at this time, if the Pontiff so directs, other Papal acts, such as the publication of canoniza- tions, may take place.
 The Public Consistory will close with the chanting of the "Te Deum" and the prayer "Card- inales Noviter Electos," while the new Cardinals prostrate them- selves before the Altar of the Chair of St. Peter. The prayer for the new Cardinals will be intoned by the Dean of the Sac- red College, 85-year-old Cardinal Genaro Granillo Pignatelli of Belmonte.
 On Friday, February 22, the second and final Secret Consisto- ry will be held. On this occasion the new Cardinals will be given their rings, and titular churches and deaneries will be assigned to them.

Reich Bishops Cited As Resistance Leaders

Cologne — (NC) — "The Ger- man Catholic Bishops, under the leadership of Cardinal Faulhaber, have an unbroken record of resistance to Nazi persecution of the Catholic Church which Hitler hated and feared," says Col. R. J. Sodenick, head of the Religious Affairs Section of the British zone high command in Germany. In an article on "Religion's role in a new Germany," carried by the British Zone Re- view.

"Several of their sermons were used as leaflets by the British Psychological Warfare Department and dropped all over Ger- many," continues the writer.
