

Funeral of Father Sherry Held in Canandaigua

Funeral services for the Rev. Walter B. Sherry, Ph.D., who died Sunday, Feb. 10, 1946 in St. Mary's Hospital, were conducted this morning (Thursday, Feb. 14, 1946) at St. Mary's Church, Canandaigua.

Pastor of St. Joseph's Church, Harvard, N.H., Father Sherry had been living with his father, John J. Sherry, 22 Perry Pl., Canandaigua, prior to going to the hospital.

His Excellency, Bishop James E. Kearney offered the Requiem Mass. Priests of the Diocese chanted the office of the dead Wednesday night. Burial was in Calvary Cemetery, Canandaigua.

Attended Burial Here
Born in Canandaigua the son of John J. and the late Anna Dorsey Sherry, Father Sherry attended St. Mary's Parochial school, Canandaigua, and the Canandaigua Academy before entering St. Andrew's Seminary, Rochester. He was president of the seminary's 1926 class.

He later attended St. Bernard's Seminary, Rochester, Belmont Abbey Seminary and College, Belmont, N. C., and St. Paul's Seminary, St. Paul, Minn.

Ordained to the priesthood June 2, 1894, by the Most Rev. John Gregory Murray, Archbishop of St. Paul, he celebrated his first low Mass at the seminary chapel the following day. First Solemn Mass was offered in St. Mary's Church June 18, 1894.

Besides his father, the priest leaves one sister, Mrs. Catherine Christoph, of Canandaigua; four brothers, John P. and Bernard M. Sherry, Canandaigua, Joseph M. Sherry, Rochester, Paul F. Sherry, Geneva; two nephews, John J. Sherry, U. S. Army, and Francis E. Sherry, Canandaigua, and two nieces, Carol Ann and Paula Lee Sherry of Geneva.
