PICTURE PARADE

RKO PALACE
"SCARLET STREET" (Obj. in part) Universal. This Walter Wanger-Fritz Lang production is cast in the mould of an earlier success, "The Woman in the Window," and presents the same main cast. A good story about bad characters in sordid seams of life, it is distinctive by reason of Lang's artistic and suspenseful presentation and the vigorous character delineations he has drawn from his artists.

Christopher Cross, middle-aged respectable cashier, who married a shrewish widow (Rosalind Ivan), is drawn into a flirtation with a shiftless young beauty (Joan Bennett), whose paramour (Dan Durva) badgers her into veiled blackmail. The cashier likes to paint; his wife protests so messy a hobby, so he takes his easel and brushes to the girl's apartment, for which he pays rent. The paramour—passed off as a casual friend—steals

the picture, markets them in the girl's name, and—grotesque as they appeared to this reviewer—they create a furor in art circles. The simple-minded cashier, freed by the discovery that his "wife's" first husband is still living, offers the girl marriage, is spurned and insulted, whereupon he kills her with an ice pick. The paramour is executed for the crime, while the real murderer is left to suffer remorse and hallucinations resulting from a guilty conscience.

Whether or not this conclusion fairly apportions retribution is questionable, but it passes the Production Code, and the story, as a whole, is so presented as to intrigue the mentally mature.
