

Jesuit Minimizes Effect Of Hiroshima Bombings

New York — (NC) — Heroic rescue work performed by missionaries in atom-bombed Hiroshima was "a greater boost for Christianity than all our work during the preceding long years," the Rev. John B. Sloman, S.J., a professor at the Catholic University of Tokyo, has written to the editors of *Jesuit Missions* here.

Father Sloman's report was called "an extraordinary document, the first detailed account of the atomic bombing of Hiroshima," by *Time*, weekly news magazine, which reprinted it in its current issue.

The Jesuit priest, who was stationed in a house of studies near Hiroshima on August 6 when the bomb fell, believes that many of the deaths attributed

to the effects of the deadly rays from the atom bomb were caused by simple undernourishment occasioned by war starvation. He is also convinced that the complete paralysis of rescue work within the city and the delay in bringing in outside workers was responsible in large measure for the heavy casualties.
