In the Army for three years, he is now employed in the Seneca Ordnance Surveillance Department.

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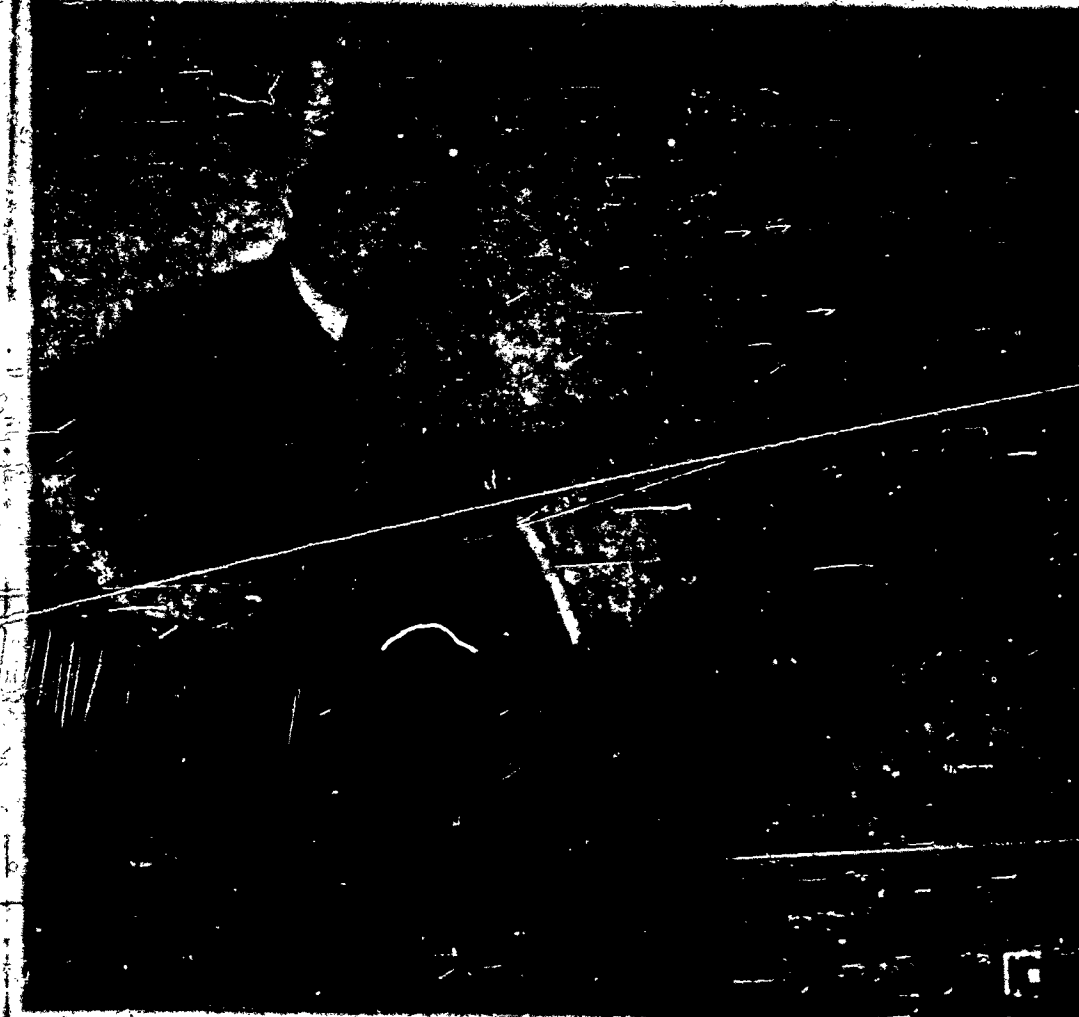
Jesuit Minimizes Effect Of Hiroshima Bombings

New York - (NC) - Heretic rescue work performed by missionaries in atom-bombed Hiroshima was "a greater boost for Christianity than all our work during the preceding long years," the Rev. John B. Stines, S.J., a professor at the Catholic University of Tokyo, has written to the editors of *Jesuit Missions* here.

Father Stines's report was called "an extraordinary document, the first detailed account of the atomic bombing of Hiroshima," by *Time*, weekly news magazine, which reprinted it in its current issue.

The Jesuit priest, who was stationed in a house of studies near Hiroshima on August 6 when the bomb fell, believes that many of the deaths attributed to the effects of the deadly rays from the atom bomb were caused by staple undernourishment con-
