2 Corning Brothers End Army Service

Corning — With the discharge of Technician Fourth Grade William E. Arnold from the Army at Fort Dix, N. J., recently both sons of Mrs. Julia Arnold, 204 W. Second St., are now back in civilian life. Robert Arnold was discharged from the Army last October at Fort MacArthur, Calif. last October.

"Bill" entered the service at Los Angeles, Calif., in January, 1943, and after basic training at Camp Berkeley, Tex., in the Medical Corps was assigned to the 315th Station hospital. He left for overseas in September, 1943, and for the next 20 months was stationed in England where he worked as a surgical technician.

Bob also entered the service in January, 1943, at Fort MacArthur and received basic training with a Military Police Escort Guard Company at Florence Internment Camp in Arizona. He went overseas in April, 1943, and took part in the African campaign and in the landings at Salerno and Anzio as well as in the battle of Cassino. He will enter the University of Southern California early next month.

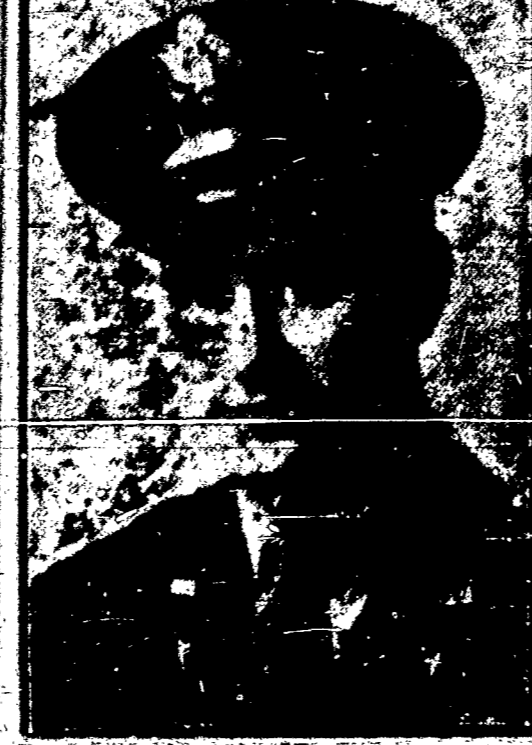
Funeral Rites in Corning
