PICTURE PARADE

TEMPLE
"LEAVE HER TO HEAVEN" *** (Adults) 20th Century-Fox. Powerful and at times heart-chilling story of a jealous young wife whose selfishness leads her to crimes which bring only tragedy and sorrow to the young husband for whom she professes deep and consuming love. Practically a literal translation of the Ben Ames Williams novel, adapted by Jo Swerling, directed by John Stahl and produced as a Darryl Zanuck special, by William Bacher, it stakes obvious claims to Academy honors. Gene Tierney as the young wife is sure to be nominated among the year's best actresses. Cornel Wilde as the husband is first-rate, so is Jeanne Crain as the foster-sister wrongly suspected by the wife of intrigue with the husband. Darryl Hickman as the devoted kid brother, whom the wife deliberately sends to his death, deserves a special Oscar. Posing questions for mature minds, the story introduces suicide as part of plot solution and makes little attempt at moral compensation.

ly to be nominated among the five best films of the year and may even snatch the final award from "Lost Weekend" and "The Bells of St. Mary's," presently the favorite contenders.

RKO PALACE
"THE LOST WEEKEND" ** (Adults) Paramount. A magnificently produced and brilliantly acted study of a dyspepsiac. Thematically depressing, this develops emphasis upon the tragic consequences of over-indulgence and implicitly argues the Catholic case for moderation. Ray Milland is seen as a young writer whose craving for drink leads him to all kinds of deception and brings him near to degradation. His brother (Phillip Terry) gives up helping him, but the girl who loves him (Jane Wyman) fights to the end and eventually there is hope of his recovery. Several scenes are too realistic for the very young, and one may prove too much for squeamish adults. Definitely an intelligent film for people who can take ugly truths.

The film is certain to arouse wide discussion and claim tremendous patronage. Magnificently done in technicolor, it is like

LOEW'S ROCHESTER
"THE HARVEY GIRLS" ** (Adults) MGM. Technicolor and music combine to make this gay tale of pioneering days a show well charged with popular appeal. The writers — eight or nine of them — provided little more than a mere flimsy whimsy. They tell us about a party of pioneering horse-and-buggy "car-hops" whom we meet on the train as they speed West to open a Harvey cafe. Their motto is "the meal must go on," and we see how they live up to it.

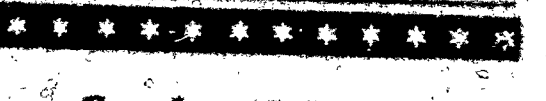
