**VA Rules to Use
Added Chaplains**

Washington — (RNS) — A notable change has been made in the rules relating to the number of chaplains to be assigned to Veterans Administration hospitals. It was disclosed here by Gen. Omar N. Bradley, veterans administrator.

Whereas full-time chaplains have heretofore been provided in hospitals of 500 or more beds, from now on every hospital having 150 beds is authorized to have one full-time chaplain, and additional chaplains are approved on the basis of each 500 patients, Gen. Hayes said.

No comment on the change was forthcoming from the Rev. Crawford W. Brown, chief of the chaplaincy service, but it has been understood for some time that he felt there should be full-time chaplains in hospitals smaller than those with 500 beds or more.

Under the new set-up, a much larger number of chaplains undoubtedly will be employed than originally was planned.

ance in the Catholic press was made in the recently published COURIER-JOURNAL VICTORY MAGAZINE. In a lead article entitled "Our Russian Relations," she warned that free American labor is endangered in the world market by the fact that Soviet economy rests upon a foundation of slave labor.

Soviet's Soviet Influence

Representative Luce was elected to Congress from the Fourth District of Connecticut in 1942, and has been one of the most active members of the House of Representatives ever since. Re-elected in 1944, she has taken the lead particularly in bringing before the Congress the facts of what she termed this country's "leaning over backwards" to avoid giving offense to Soviet Russia.

On the floor of the House and in the Congressional Record under extension of remarks, Mrs. Luce has stressed the Soviet influence that has been permitted to dominate particularly the government of the countries of Eastern Europe.

A member of the House Military Affairs Committee, Mrs. Luce with several colleagues visited European countries a year ago on a tour of American military installations in the European Theater of operations. On this tour she was received in audience by His Holiness Pope Pius XII.

Last January 30 she announced publicly that she will not be a candidate for Congress in the campaign next fall.

Not a Candidate

Born Clare Boothe in New York City on April 10, 1900, Mrs. Luce attended St. Mary's Episcopal School, Culver City, N. Y., and Miss Mason's Castle School, Bryn Mawr, Pa., and holds an honorary degree of doctor of laws from Colby College, Waterville, Me.

She became prominent in the field of journalism in 1926 when she was made an associate editor of *Vogue*. Later she became associate editor and then managing editor of *Vanity Fair*. In 1935 she was married to Henry H. Luce, founder of Time, Life and *Newsweek* magazines. Mrs. Luce's only child, a daughter by a former marriage, was killed in an automobile accident on the West Coast in 1948.

Up to the time of her election to Congress Mrs. Luce was best known as an active and successful playwright. She is the author of several Broadway hits, and in addition to articles and books for magazines, she has written two books.

Her hobbies include painting and a love of travel.
