

# Trapp Family Hailed In Auburn Concert

Auburn — The Trapp Family Singers presented their first concert in Auburn under the auspices of Auburn Council, Knights of Columbus on Thursday evening before a near capacity audience in East High School Auditorium.

The Trapp Family, the most heavily booked singing attraction in America's concert history, received the enthusiastic applause of music lovers in Auburn and vicinity. The Von Trapps were a real attraction to Auburnians not only because of their rare musical ability but because of the wholesome picture of family life they portrayed and the warm spirit of friendliness with which they greeted their audience. They seemed to enjoy presenting the program as much as the audience enjoyed listening to it.

The Von Trapps traveled to Auburn in their private bus. This concert was part of a nation wide tour they are making at this season. From Auburn they will go to the southern part of the United States to present concerts.

**Balanced Program**  
The Auburn program opened with the singing of Pueri Hebraeorum by Palestrina, the Crux fidelis by King John IV of Portugal; the Ave Marie by Mozart and the Psalm No. 23 (The Lord is my Shepherd) by Schubert. This was followed by two movements from Sonata in B flat major by G. P. Telemann for Alto Recorder and Cingral; two movements from Sonata in C Major by Mozart for three woodwinds; The Spinning Song arranged by A. Aslanoff and Three Austrian Folk Dances for recorders and Virginal arranged by F. Wanner.

The Baroness then introduced her seven daughters and Dr. Franz Wanner, the conductor and priest friend of the family, and expressed the hope that the singing of her family might inspire other family groups to similar efforts and thus make music a part of every day family life. The ancient instruments, recorders, virginal and spinet, were shown to the audience and their use explained. To close this part of the program the Trapp Family Singers sang "Sing we and chant it" by Thomas Morley and "The Cuckoo" by Johann Steiani. Following the intermission a group of folk songs and yodels from the Austrian Alps were presented. The audience was particularly delighted with this part of the program. The concert was concluded with the singing of "Early One Morning" and "The Old Woman and the Pedler" both arranged by K. K. Davis; a folk song from the Appalachian Mountains; "The River" arranged by F. Wanner; and the Evening Prayer from "Hansel and Gretel" by Humperdinck. For an encore they sang Brahms' "Lullaby."

The reviewer for Auburn's Citizen Advertiser made this statement concerning the concert: "The Trapp Family's appearance here was sponsored by Auburn Council, 207, Knights of Columbus, and Auburn's music lovers will join in thanking the Knights for an unusually pleasant evening. May one hope that the Knights of Columbus may be spurred by the success of this venture to bring other musical attractions to this community, which, though it is rich in local musical talent, has too few opportunities to hear the great and famous concert artists?"

## New Jersey College Offers Scholarships

Four scholarships valued at \$5000.00 are open to freshmen enrolling at the College of St. Elizabeth for September, 1946. The Sister Mary Pauline Scholarship offers an annual grant of \$250.00; The Sister Regina Clara Scholarship, an annual grant of \$500.00. Two additional scholarships each awarding \$250.00 annually to the holders are also offered.

These scholarships are open to Catholic high school girls and Catholic girls in public high schools who are eligible to compete for them through the College Entrance Board Examination to be held in Rochester April 6, 1946.

To be eligible to compete, the applicant must:

1. Offer the fifteen units of high school credit required for admission.

2. Rank in the highest quarter of her class.

3. Be recommended by the principal of her high school as qualified for college work.

Application blanks will be mailed. Address: College of St. Elizabeth, Convent Station, New Jersey.

With the application must be submitted a transcript of the applicant's high school record indicating her rank in the class together with a letter of recommendation from her principal. This information must be in the hands of the Committee on Scholarships not later than March 1, 1946.

This money will be forwarded to George Ross Bobs, prominent newspaper publisher of Roosevelt Plaza, New York City, at whose request the campaign was carried out. Mr. Bobs engineered a nationwide drive, which has been in progress for the past 3 months and will close sometime in March.

People of Italian birth and Italian descent were approached in all towns and cities of the United States. The money is to be used for the purchase of medicine, food and clothing for the

people of Italy who have been impoverished as a result of the war. \$500 was also collected by a committee in Waterloo.
