Million Mark Passed In College Fund Drive

Dubuque — More than one million dollars was received in cash and pledges in 1945 for the Loras College memorial expansion fund. The fund campaign opened last October with a goal of half a million.

Total receipts to the end of the year were \$1,004,230, according to an announcement by Archbishop Henry P. Rohman, Coadjutor Archbishop of Dubuque and Chancellor of the college. The sum includes a \$12,500 Father Al Schmitt memorial contribution, honoring the Rev. Aloysius H. Schmitt, Navy Chaplain killed in the Pearl Harbor attack.

Father Schmitt was a Loras alumnus.

Catholic Digest Edition For Ireland, Britain

St. Paul, Minn. — (NC) — Ireland and Great Britain now have their own edition of the Catholic Digest, it has been disclosed at the magazine's headquarters here. Printer's mats of the January American edition were flown from St. Paul to Dublin so that the two editions could appear simultaneously.

Patrick Cannon, of the National Press, Dublin, is director of the new venture. Because Ireland still rationed paper, the number of copies printed was limited.

The Catholic Digest also publishes a South American edition from Buenos Aires, Argentine, as well as a Braille edition, printed here.

Buffalo Talk Set By Fr. Brennan

Rev. Gerald T. Brennan, pastor of St. Bridget's Church, Rochester, and author of the popular "Angel Voice" series for juveniles, will lecture on children's literature at the Hotel Statler in Buffalo this Friday, Feb. 22.

Noted for his popularity with children, Father Brennan will address an adult audience on the subject "100,000 Kids Can't Be Wrong." This lecture is being sponsored by Catholic groups of the city for the purpose of promoting better reading material among the children of Buffalo and vicinity.

The Rochester priest is well-known in the neighboring diocese and only recently addressed Buffalo audiences at a Book Fair in the Knights of Columbus Auditorium.

Monumental Shrine Rises in Montreal

Montreal — (RNS) — Construction of the monumental religious shrine depicting the Way of the Cross on the flanks of Montreal's Mount Royal, adjoining St. Joseph's Oratory, has been resumed after a war-impeded standstill.

Covering an area of 175,000 square feet with figures cast in bronze, one and a half times greater than life size, the project is expected to keep the sculptor, Louis Parent, busy for the next eight years. Three years of work have been put into the monument already.

The shrine, when completed, will stand in landscaped surroundings, lighted at night with modern equipment. A garden with sculptured figures illustrating the seven sorrows of the Virgin Mary will also be created. In addition, museum and office buildings are scheduled to be erected on the mountain side.

Workers have already begun hewing rock from the mountain to set the stage for the Way of the Cross. Parent, chosen from a number of artists, has completed seven of the 40 statues that will appear, and even they are only in the plaster-cast stage. At his present rate of progress he can turn out four a year.

Supervisor of the project is Father Ephraim Brassard, 35-year-old priest who was sent to the United States to inspect religious monuments there before plans for this undertaking took final shape.

8 Million Pounds of Food Going Overseas

New York — (RNS) — Eight million pounds of food have been processed and are ready for export overseas as part of a campaign conducted by the War Relief Services of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, Edward M. Kinney, campaign manager, announced here.

More than 20,000,000 cans of food have been received so far, Kinney said, with 700,000 pounds already on their way to Poland. At San Francisco, 1,000,000 pounds of cans have been received, with 200,000 pounds en route to the Philippines.

Employing 25 men in processing and packing, the warehouse here is turning out 300 cases an hour. An average of 200 railroad cars arrive here every day from Chicago.

Q.—My husband will soon be discharged from the service due to a disability and our insurance agent states that he will have to pay a higher premium on his insurance because of this disability?

A.—If your husband continues his National Service Life Insurance he will not have to take an examination, nor will his premium payments be increased due to his disability.

Q.—Is it true that the G. I. Bill provides that monies paid by the government for education, under the G. I. Bill be deducted from any bonus that may be authorized in the future?

A.—The G. I. Bill is so worded, however, the legislation authorizing the payment of a bonus may void this part of the G. I. Bill.

Q.—I have had four years in the armed forces and wish to study for the priesthood. Will the government pay for my expenses at the seminary under the G. I. Bill?

A.—Yes, for the Bill provides that you may select the school of your choice and the studies of your choice. Your age at the time of your induction would determine whether or not you would be entitled to four years of education.

Q.—Are there any laws of business that a G. I. may wish to enter that are prohibited from loans under the G. I. Bill?

A.—None that we know of, usually unlawful ventures would not be so accommodated.

Q.—Is it true that veterans are supposed to get their old jobs back at any time they apply for same under Selective Service?

A.—The law provides that returning servicemen and women are entitled to their former positions, or ones of equal salary and position, providing they make application within 90 days after their discharge. After the 90 day period it is up to their former employer.

Q.—Should veterans join a veterans organization upon discharge?

A.—Yes, they should join those they are qualified to join, to protect their interests and those of their families. Recognized veteran service organizations serve the veteran and members of his family and should have his support.
