

Military Rites Set for Soldier Killed Accidentally

Auburn — Pvt. William Donnelly, 18-year-old son of Mrs. May Rose Donahue Donnelly, 37 North Street, was accidentally killed Saturday, March 9, 1946, during target practice at Fort Bliss, Texas. Word of the death of the popular young Auburnian who went to Fort Bliss last January came as a shock to his many relatives.

The War Department has stated that Pvt. Donnelly was killed when struck by a bullet that ricocheted after hitting the target. He was taken to the hospital but was pronounced dead upon arrival.

Pvt. Donnelly was 16 in Nov. 1945, and left Auburn last January 16 for Fort Bliss where he was attached to an anti-aircraft battalion. He would have finished his basic training by July 1, and was expected to spend a furlough at his home. A letter received from him on March 11 said that he might be able to visit his home around the first of April.

Pvt. Donnelly was graduated from Holy Family High School with the Class of 1945. He was a good student, prominent in school activities and played on the varsity football team. For a time he was employed at Conboy's and Dairyland.

He is survived by his mother, three brothers. Donald recently honorably discharged from the U. S. Air Corps and a student at Niagara University; Robert Donnelly of the U. S. Navy, stationed at Philadelphia, Pa.; Thomas, a student in Holy Family School; his grandmother, Mrs. Julia Donnelly; two aunts, Misses Allan and Loretta Donahue; two uncles, John and Edmund Donahue, all of Auburn; three great aunts, Miss Nellie Bowen, Mrs. William Meagher, Miss Margaret Bennett; and a great uncle, Rev. John Bennett of Chicago.

The body of Pvt. Donnelly accompanied by a military escort arrived in Auburn on Wednesday morning and was taken to the family home in North Street. The funeral will be held on Friday morning at Holy Family Church with burial in St. Joseph's Cemetery.
