either of the individual or the community.

### Responsibility To Vote

(2). "The exercise of the right to vote is an act of grave responsibility, at least when there is the question involved of electing those whose office it will be to give the country its constitution and its laws, particularly those laws which affect, for example, the sanctification of feast days, marriage, family life and school, and which give direction, according to justice and equity, to the various phases of social life. It, therefore, falls to the Church to explain to the faithful their moral duties which derive from their right to vote.

(3). "Article 32 of the Concordat concluded in 1929 between the Holy See and Italy forbids ecclesiastics in Italy 'to belong to, or participate in, any political party.' The Church intends to follow this disposition faithfully, and she is also ready to repress and punish any infraction of this law on the part of individual ecclesiastics. On her part, the Church does not wish to be involved, in any way, in merely political questions. In these she allows Catholics as such full liberty of opinion and action. On the other hand, however, she cannot renounce the abovementioned right (formulated in point number one) nor could she admit the position that the State may unilaterally judge her priests in the exercise of their ministry.

(The Pope here referred to the recent draft of a law proposed to the Italian Consulta which would impose severe civil penalties upon priests convicted of "preaching politics" from the pulpit.)

### Mission of Priests

(4). "The Catholic priest cannot simply be placed on a level with public officials or others possessing public authority, be it civil or military. The latter are employees of representatives of the State on which, under Divine law, they depend and for which they exercise their duties

on behalf of the legitimate interests of the State. The State, therefore, can enact dispositions pertinent to their conduct, not excluding political questions.

"The priest, on the contrary, is a minister of the Church and he has a mission which includes, as we have already indicated, the entire circle of religious and moral duties of his people. In the fulfillment of this mission the priest can therefore be obliged to give, under this religious aspect, counsel and instruction also regarding public duties. Now it is evident that possible abuses of that mission cannot of themselves be left to the judgment of civil authorities, for thus the pastors would be exposed to obstacles and injuries which might be provoked by groups not well-disposed toward the Church under the easy pretext of wishing to separate the clergy from politics.

"Let it not be forgotten," the Holy Father reminded, "that it was precisely under this pretext of wishing to combat so-called 'political Catholicism' that national socialism — which, in reality, desired nothing else than to destroy the Church.

**Duties Confront Pastors**  
"The Catholic Church will never allow herself to be shut up within the four walls of the church. The separation between religion and life, between the Church and the world is contrary to the Christian and Catholic idea."

The Pontiff opened his discourse by contrasting the misery and anguish of hard and troubled years with the Divine Providence that made possible works of mercy amidst the anguish. The scourge of war brought everywhere a growing wave of corrupted habits, leading to the downfalls of souls entrusted to the pastors, the Pope said.

Here and there appear signs of revival and improvement as peace begins to dawn, the Holy Father said, pointing out that as a result of the war many serious duties confront the pastors. "We are thinking, above all, of the protection of delinquent youths," the Pope explained, "and healing the deep wounds inflicted particularly upon the sanctity of marriage and conjugal fidelity.

"To these urgent duties we add another no less serious: reviving a sense of right and justice in the whole social life, promoting always more and more works of Christian charity."

### Magr. Shay Gives Eulogy

The Priests Choir consisted of the Reverend Fathers Charles McCarthy, William J. Ayers, Herbert Sturmer, Arthur F. Ratigan, Orrin Feller, Edward McAniff, Robert Meng, Lloyd Hogan, John L. McCafferty, John Roach, and E. Leo McManus.

The Eulogy was preached by the Rt. Rev. Magr. Charles F. Shay who paid tribute to Father Ganey as a priest and as a citizen. Father Ganey, he said, was straightforward in everything he said and did, and was "a perfect Alter Christus." As a citizen, the late pastor of St. Felix Church, proved by his courage under fire when First Division Army Chaplain in World War I that he was ready at all times to stand forth for his nation's welfare. Magr. Shay declared.

Ordained June 6, 1908, after completing his studies at St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminaries, Rochester, Father Ganey prior to going to St. Felix Church had served at St. Michael's Church, Newark, as pastor from Feb. 12, 1927, to Nov. 1, 1935.

His first assignment was as Assistant Pastor, Immaculate Conception Church, Rochester. He was Chaplain at the State School in Industry before entering the Army and returned there. He was named pastor of St. Dominic's Church, Shortsville, July 18, 1922.

Father Ganey, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Daniel J. Ganey, was born in Auburn, Jan. 30, 1883. He is survived by a sister, Mrs. Frank T. Curtin of Rochester.

Burial took place in St. Joseph's Cemetery, Tuesday afternoon where priests of Auburn sang the Benedictus. Members of the American Legion furnished an escort.

## Dutch Bishops Ban New Trade Union

The Hague — (RNS) — The Catholic Hierarchy of Holland has issued a pastoral letter forbidding Catholics to become members of the new Unity Trade Union movement because it is a "Communist organization." The letter was read in all Catholic churches throughout the country. The Bishops also declared that the ban on Catholic membership in the N.V.V. (Dutch Trade Union Congress) and other Socialist organizations would be continued until the facts "show that the aims and principles of such organizations are no longer in opposition to Christian beliefs and the Christian faith."
