

Mass, Cemetery Rite Mark Saint's Feast

Opening with Solemn Pontifical Mass and highlighted by a prayerful remembrance of the late Mrs. Catherine T. Wheelwright, mother of Eamon DeValera, Premier of Eire, St. Patrick's Feast was observed on Saturday, March 16 because of the feast falling this year on Sunday.

His Excellency, Bishop Kearney celebrated the Mass at St. Patrick's Church, officiated at the Rite to Mrs. Wheelwright at her grave in Holy Sepulchre cemetery where her other son, the Rev. Thomas J. Wheelwright, S.S.R., resided. The Bishop addressed the Knights of Equity and guests numbering 750 at Towers Hotel at dinner in the evening.

Father Wheelwright delivered the annual panegyric at the Solemn Pontifical Mass. He cited evils menacing the world today and as a bulwark against these evils called for the strength possessed in the faith of Irish forefathers which they developed during 600 years of persecution.

Liberalism Mark Day
A gala celebration featured by Irish songs and dances took place under the auspices of the Ancient Order of Hibernians and Ladies Auxiliaries at the Sheraton Hotel. The Knights of Columbus marked the day with a supper

in their clubrooms in Columbus Civic Center.

The 11th annual banquet of the Knights of Equity was characterized as "a gathering of memories" by Bishop Kearney who said the songs sung served to recall the hardy pioneers of Irish stock who helped lay the foundation for a great United States of America. The Bishop recalled the morning ceremony honoring the late Mrs. Wheelwright and said she symbolized the Irish mothers whose spirit had contributed so much in the advancement made in Ireland and here in America.

With Harry E. Crowley as toastmaster and James P. R. Duffy as chairman with Michael T. Ryan, vice supreme air knight of the national organization as co-chairman, the program at the Knights of Equity was well-balanced with song, music and stories dear to the Irish.

Dante Talk Set Sunday At Aquinas

From Fordham University Graduate School comes the Rev. Gerald Walsh, S.J., Ph.D., head



of the department of Italian Studies, as a speaker this Sunday (Mar. 24) in the sixth event of the Christian Culture Series at Aquinas auditorium.

An acknowledged world authority on "Dante," Doctor Walsh will lecture on the great poet of the middle ages beginning at 8 p. m. Born in Norwalk, Conn., Doctor Walsh was ordained a priest in the Society of Jesus in 1924. Most of his studies were pursued at London and in the Gregorian University in Rome. In 1934 he returned to Rome to take over a post as professor of medieval history at the University.

He later became the editor of "Thought," a quarterly review of Catholic contemporary thought and culture published by Fordham University Graduate School professors.

He is a medalist of London's Royal Geographic Society, a Gibbs scholar in modern history and Marquis of Lothian prizeman at Oxford University.

Among his works are "The Emperor Charles IV," "Medieval Humanism," "The Catholic Philosophy of History," and "Faith for Today," as well as many learned treatises on "Dante."

His lecture here Sunday is constructed for those familiar with the great thinker and those who are anxious to learn.

The Bishop and State Deputy Foley will speak at the Communion Breakfast following at which 400 Knights and their seas are expected by General Chairman Raymond L. Nary to attend. Thomas T. Fies is chief chairman. Raymond J. Hassauer has charge of music.

Grand Knight Francis T. Toomey will greet the State Deputy and make the council's report.

Urge President to Halt Ukrainian Deportation

A resolution urging President Truman to call a halt to the deportation of Ukrainians to the Soviet Union and to certain death in Siberia, has been drafted and forwarded to the President by 3,000 Americans of Ukrainian descent.

This action was taken at a meeting Monday evening in the parish hall of St. Joseph's Ukrainian Catholic Church following an address by Dr. Long in Coblesky, editor of the Ukrainian Catholic newspaper American.

Appealing to the President "in the name of humanity" to stop "this barbaric procedure" the document requests that Ukrainians be granted the right of asylum and the right to make preparations for resettling in thinly populated areas of the Americas.

Departed Ukrainians "are sent as slave laborers to Siberia to meet certain death," the resolution asserts.

Moscow Misleading

In his address Dr. Coblesky discredited Joseph Stalin as a spokesman for the Ukrainian Church declaring that a Moscow announcement that the Western Ukrainian Church had terminated a 200-year-old allegiance to the Vatican was misleading.

There is no such thing as the

Episcopal Church Council of the United Church of the Western Ukraine the former Ukrainian diplomat stated, because the Soviets have removed all eight bishops who composed the council in Galatz, which he said constitutes Western Ukraine. Hundreds of priests including his brother-in-law were also taken away, the speaker said, and sent to Siberia where three bishops died.

Dr. Coblesky was a member of the Austrian Parliament from 1908 to 1918 and served as Ukrainian Secretary of State after World War I. He also headed the Ukrainian diplomatic mission sent here to seek recognition of the Ukrainian state after it was set up following the war. While he was in Washington, the Ukraine collapsed as a separate state and he decided to remain here and become a diplomat.

The Rev. Basil Turak, pastor of St. Joseph's Church explained that the parish holds allegiance to Rome with the Catholic Diocese of Rochester and will remain there.
