### The Road And Parents

(Excerpts from Lenten Sermon, "The Road and Parents," by the Rev. Donald M. Cleary, Catholic Chaplain, Cornell University delivered at Old St. Mary's Church, Rochester.)

If the Mothers and Fathers of Nazi Germany ten years ago had had the courage to forbid their children to take part in the Hitler Youth Movement, even if they had even those children go to death, they would not have lived to see those same children march off to war and ultimately become, if they lived at all, citizens in a defeated nation. There would have been no war if all the parents of Europe had been obedient to their responsibilities as parents.

When you talk to the Mothers or Fathers of today, you get a sense of helplessness. It is not so much the fact that they do not know what they want their children to do and to be, but rather they do not know how to achieve these objectives.

They tell you that their sons and daughters have become insolent, demanding, and selfish, and put the blame on the fact that all the other children are doing the same thing and therefore they cannot deny to their children the things which other children do.

The part which the modern parent has played in the modern crucifixion of Christ is simply this — that they have turned over too much of the training of their children to other agencies, particularly to the school and the church. They have forgotten that the responsibility is primarily theirs — that they are parents whose authority comes directly from God and for the exercise of which authority they must ultimately answer to God.

In the Army the greatest difficulty was the disciplining of soldiers because they had never been taught the meaning of discipline in their homes. The modern parent must learn to say NO more often than he says YES. The indulgent parent is the one who lives to see sorrow because of those children.

In how many homes today is grace said before meals? Is there any attempt at family prayers? There is nothing which unites a family quite so much as when the Mother and Father gather their young ones about them and in unison lift their hearts and minds to God.

### Chaplain Gefell Gets Army Award in Japan

With the Eighth Army, Kyoto, Japan — Captain Joseph G. Gefell, son of Mr. and Mrs. August E. Gefell, 42 Lill Street, Rochester, was recently among the first men in I Groups Headquarters to be awarded the Army Commendation Ribbon.

Chaplain Gefell, a Catholic priest in the Chaplain's Corps, received the commendation on Feb. 19 for meritorious service during the period from August 1945 to January 1946, "for providing, while bivouacked in Rosales, Philippine Islands, spiritual care for headquarters troops and for outlying units which did not possess Chaplains, at a time when there was a critical shortage of Chaplains in Corps. For helping to maintain the mental, moral and spiritual stability of our troops when their morale was no longer at a battle pitch — For establishing, by his own personal initiative and hard labor, two chapels (in Osaka, Japan) in widely separated sections of the city — both of which chapels were regarded by all who saw them as the most beautiful and worshipful any had ever seen while in service overseas.

Prior to volunteering into the Army in March 1945, Chaplain Gefell was a priest in the Diocese of Rochester. He studied at St. Bernard's Seminary in Rochester and was ordained in 1941.

Fr. Raymond, O.F.M. Conv., has good Lenten advice for Tertiaries in a recent message from which an excerpt follows:

"Now the essential elements of the Franciscan spirit are poverty, penance and prayer; these are the foundation stones upon which the Third Order is built. It is clear therefore the Third Order not only has the answer to the question: 'Will there be a lasting peace?' Peace will come through penance, and lasting peace must rest upon the foundation stones of the Third Order, for they are basic in Christ's Gospel teaching.

"The more vicious enemies rise up against Christ," said Leo XIII, "the more eager they are to root out from the hearts of His Divine Gospel, so much the more grows the work of the Tertiaries for the glory of Christ and the public good. You will increase this joyful hope if you practice mortification, for your institution is called the Order of Penance; if you will also exercise yourself in Prayer, which is the very life of the Third Order; and finally if you possess the crown and complement of it all, namely, the love of God and your neighbor."
