Each employee will receive a week's vacation, with pay, during the week of July 1, and will be covered by insurance premiums to be paid by the company, covering hospitalization for the beneficiary and his family, life insurance and accident.

This concern manufactures yarns and employs approximately 150 people. The late George Geb was President for many years and the business is now carried on by his heirs.

Auburn — Among the British war brides who will arrive in America on March 28 is Mrs. Mary Lavarnway and 11 months old daughter, Mary Patricia, wife and daughter of John W. Lavarnway, 43 Grant Avenue.

Mr. Lavarnway and the former Mary Tully were married in the Catholic Cathedral at Bristol, England. Mr. Lavarnway is a graduate of Auburn schools and the University of Toronto, Canada. He served in the African and Italian campaigns being assigned to a dental unit of the Army Medical Corps. He was honorably discharged from service a few months ago.

London — (CIP) — Owing to considerable pressure from the Russian occupation authorities as well as from the Rumanian Communists, the Executive Committee of the Social Democratic Party of Rumania in Bucharest, decided by a vote of 19 to 10, to agree to "joint lists" with the Communists in the coming elections.

It is generally believed that Russian pressure for "joint lists" in Rumania as well as in Eastern Germany, Poland and other countries in the Russian sphere of influence, is based on the realization that the Communists, if they presented themselves alone and under their own name, would obtain an insignificant vote as they did in Hungary and Austria.

K. of C. Scholarship Applications Due

New York — Applications will close on April 6 and examinations will be held on May 4 in various sections of New York State for the eight college scholarships offered annually by the Knights of Columbus. It has been announced by Joseph M. Foley, state deputy of New York. Forms are being issued by grand knights of the 260 local councils in cities and towns of the State and are returnable to the scholarship chairman John P. McArde, 7620 6th Avenue, Brooklyn.

January graduates those who will graduate in June from recognized high schools who are sons, daughters, sisters or brothers of living and deceased members of the K. of C. or members for two years of the Columbian Squires, the junior order, are eligible.

Winners receive \$200 a year for four years to be applied to tuition in any college of New York State conducted under Catholic auspices and empowered by the Regents to confer degrees. Holders of older scholarships may receive the K. of C. awards.
