UNO Meet Expected To Clarify Red Aims

The meeting of the eleven members of the Security Council of the United Nations Organization now underway in New York is more important perhaps than the gathering of the Assembly itself.

The Council is the heart of the whole organization. Within its jurisdiction come decisions on the great issues. We may consider that the Charter of the United Nations is full of holes to allow the Security Council such wide powers and such broad jurisdiction. But we must take it as it is.

Do the New York sessions hold out any substantial promise as a step toward strengthening the whole organization and, at the same time, provide for the settlement of the immediate issues of the day? The answer must be an unqualified "yes."

Christianity Lead Asked Of Hirohito

Tokyo - Out of a piece of paper has come the plan of a former Japanese Ambassador to Italy, Toshi Shiroto, urging Christianity as the way forward for Japan to follow.

From Supreme Prince, where he is availing the outcome of charges with other accused of war crimes, Shiroto has addressed a letter to Japanese Foreign Minister Yasuoka, suggesting that the Emperor lead the way by becoming a Christian.

"The disillusionment of the people is complete," he states. "If Shintoism of Japan really means the way of God, a thorough overhauling is long overdue. Since there cannot be two universal Gods, the true attributes of God and the true attributes of the Supreme Being have nowhere been so unambiguously made manifest as in Jesus. I see no reason why the teachings of Christ should not be accepted by us without reserve."

"A key to the quick solution of the problem might be found in the Shinto system. Suppose the present Emperor were to convert to Christianity himself and to lead the entire nation in that direction? Would not that result in practically Christianizing the nation wholesale and almost at a stroke?"

Cardinal Von Galen Dies in 68th Year

Cardinal von Galen, 68, was placed under "house arrest" by the Gestapo, but his resistance later was rewarded in an air raid. In 1942, he was arrested by the Gestapo for a sermon he delivered which bitterly condemned their activities.

In 1943, under the leadership of Cardinal von Galen, (then bishop) Catholic parents fearlessly voted in favor of parochial schools and everywhere in Münster-territory religious institutions were given the clergy, employing a catechism published by the bishop himself.

In Odenburg, the Gauleiter was all but compelled by popular demand to withdraw one of his own directives through which crucifixes had been ordered removed from public schools.

A series of air raids in the summer of 1941 destroyed a great part of Münster and the Gestapo began a violent campaign to eliminate large centers of religious life, banishing priests, nuns and brothers from the country. Bishop von Galen in a sermon condemned the Gestapo tactics in terms which never before had been heard in Hitler Germany. The following day he dispatched a telegram to the Government of the Reich, protesting strongly against the Gestapo and asking government protection against the secret police activities.

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Marriage Course Given by Mail

Ottawa - (INC) - The Catholic Centre, Extension Department of the University of Ottawa, has undertaken a gigantic work in an effort to effect the rising tide of divorces and marriage instability.

Practical of the university, which is directed by the Oblates of Mary Immaculate, with the help of Catholic authorities in the fields of medicine, economics and law, have perfected a correspondence course known as "Marriage Preparation Service."

The Rev. Andrew Guay, O.M.I., is director of this extension work, and each parish priest in Canada and the United States will soon receive a complete outline of the service. The course of 15 lessons has already been completed.

is far more convincing and even alarming than the ability or inability of the UNO to do something about it. If there is failure or if we are not satisfied, we need not cast blame on UNO. Rather should we place the responsibility where it ought to lie; at the door of our own Department of State. And this also applies to the British Foreign Office and to all those who are in high places in former of foreign relations.

A Test of The Charter

We have come to the testing of the work done at the UNO meeting in San Francisco. Those of little faith have accused the UNO long before its agencies have been given the slightest chance to prove its worth. Many Americans were dissatisfied with the performance of our diplomats at the UNO meeting in London and there was some justification for a sense of frustration, even fear, that we had come out badly in the first post-war contest with the Soviets.

But there is no justification for the conclusion that it is time to throw in the sponge and abandon the UNO as a mockery and a fraud. If there were no crises, friction and aggravation, the need of an organization like UNO would be entirely theoretical.

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
