POSTHUMOUS HEROISM AWARD FOR AUBURNIAN

Auburn — Pfc. William F. Walsh, who died a year ago at Luzon, was awarded the Bronze Star posthumously at a ceremony at the Auburn recruiting office on Thursday.

The citation was signed by Edward P. Witold, Major General. The award was made "For heroic actions in connection with military operations against the enemy at Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 11-21, March 1945. Private Walsh fearlessly and bravely led carrying parties over several thousand yards of difficult and hazardous terrain through enemy-infested areas to deliver vitally needed supplies to the front lines. Although he suffered great physical exhaustion and numerous hardships on his daily 16-hour trip, he hesitatingly continued to volunteer for the mission as the supply line lengthened. On March 21, the enemy became very active along the supply route but Private Walsh boldly leading the column pushed through to supply successfully the front-line elements. On the return trip still leading the column he was instantly killed by a burst of hostile machine-gun fire. Private Walsh displayed inspiring devotion to duty, indomitable courage and superb leadership which will be remembered."

William Walsh was inducted into the Army on April 1, 1943, and was sent to Fort Niagara and from there to Fort Leonard Wood. He volunteered for overseas service and in September, 1943, was sent to Camp Stoneham, California, and left for overseas duty in November.

He saw service in the Philippines, New Zealand, New Guinea and the Philippines. He was awarded the Purple Heart for wounds received during the Philippine battles and the Good Conduct Medal. Pvt. Walsh would have been 21 years old on the first of this month. He was a senior at West High School when he entered the service. He was a graduate of St. Alphonsus Parochial School and a member of St. Alphonsus Parish.

Lay Groups' Strength Needed Says K. C. Head

Spirituality of the Holy Name Society on the one hand and the militancy of the Knights of Columbus on the other were never more needed in the history of our country than they are today, declared Joseph M. Foley, state deputy, in addressing 320 members of the Knights of Columbus and their sons, Sunday morning at Powers Hotel.

The New York attorney was speaking at the annual Communion Breakfast of Rochester Council following corporate Communion at Mass in St. Patrick's Church.

His Excellency, Bishop Kearney, who celebrated the Mass and addressed the knights, both at the church and at the breakfast was termed "The Next Knight of the Empire State" by Foley who reported that New York State Council exceeded its membership quota for the year on March 1.

The state deputy recognized the LaSalle speech in New York and the picketing by 500 communists of New York City hall because of the appointment of an outstanding Catholic layman, George A. Timmons to the New York Board of Education.

"Today it is not a question of conflict between nations," the state leader declared, "but whether you are for Christ or against Christ."

He emphasized how essential religion in education was for the continuation of the American way of life and asked if anyone ever heard of a Catholic school being investigated to find if any subversive activity was present in it.

The speaker warned that certain elements in the nation today strive for the downfall of the democratic way of life, and of Holy Mother, the Church and her principles. He stressed the need for personal sanctification and determination that no social or economic philosophy will take root in this country inimical to the American way of life.

Bishop Kearney said that the citizenship of a K. of C. Council is to be a sign of its best indication of its efficiency. "Whether it be a local or state council, I've never found a more responsible group when it was a sign of the heart of Holy Mother, the Church than the Knights of Columbus in that council."

The Bishop told the knights to plan to spend a weekend with Christ at the Diocesan Retreat House on Geneva Lake to gain the spiritual strength necessary for combating growing world evil.

Grand Knight Francis T. Cooney presided at the breakfast program and paid tribute to the late District Deputy Walter R. O'Neill, past commander of whose death was March 26.

Assisting the Bishop at St. Patrick's were the Rev. William J. Schilling, council chaplain and the Rev. Leo C. Murphy, pastor of St. Patrick's. Raymond J. MacIntyre was in charge of music at the church and breakfast was March 26.

MARINE OFFICER DIES FROM HURTS

Auburn — Lieut. Maurice E. Walsh, son of Mr. and Mrs. Maurice Walsh, 101 St. of Mrs. Maurice, formerly of Auburn and grandson of Mrs. Mary Walsh of Auburn, died March 14, 1945, at the Coronado California Naval Hospital.

Death was due to a spinal injury suffered while fighting at Iwo Jima on March 10, 1945. Lieut. Walsh was a member of the Fourth Marine Division and had been in the service since 1941. He enlisted as a private and worked up through the ranks until commissioned a Lieutenant. Following his injuries he was hospitalized in several different Naval Hospitals on the west coast.

Lieut. Walsh's wife, the former Miss Jeanne Cooper of Auburn, and his mother were with him when he died. The young naval officer is also survived by a son, Michael, 3 months old, three brothers, Donald, Richard and Thomas, and a sister, Mary Ann. The funeral was held at St. Vincent's Church, Auburn, on Saturday morning.

Bishop Kearney Heads School Jubilee Group

New York — A series of events marking the establishment of St. Cecilia's School on East 10th St., fifty years ago is being planned here.

The Most Rev. James E. Kearney, Bishop of Rochester who served as superintendent of St. Cecilia's School for 18 years and all the priests, Sisters of Mercy who taught through the 50 years, fifty Christian Brothers now assigned as the faculty, students, parishioners, alumni and friends will gather in tribute at the many festivals being organized.

The Redevelopment Fathers took charge of the parish seven years ago. Due to demand His Eminence Francis Cardinal Spellman established an annex to St. Cecilia's known as the Commander John J. Shea Memorial. This addition is said to have given St. Cecilia's one of the largest parochial schools in the United States, a fact that will be noted during the jubilee.

Bishop Kearney is honorary chairman, the Rev. Jeremiah Sheehan, general chairman and the Hon. James A. Corcoran, alumnus chairman of the Golden Jubilee program.
