## Preserve Rights UN Urged in Geneva K. of C. Resolution

Geneva—Calling upon delegates to the United Nations to work for the establishment of the Four Freedoms and for peace based on justice and charity, members of Geneva Council No. 272, Knights of Columbus have adopted a resolution, copies of which have been sent to Secretary James F. Byrne, Senator James M. Mead, Senator Robert F. Wagner and Congressman John Taber.

The resolution follows: "Whereas—Geneva Council No. 272 of the KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS of the City of Geneva, and state of New York, being interested in reaching a solution of the problems of the world today to the end that peace may be maintained and the nations and peoples of the world may live in harmony and mutual understanding, and

"Whereas—the Council and its members believe that the principles enunciated in the objectives of the UN can be properly exercised so much to accomplish this end and further believe that if the great ideals enunciated in the Atlantic Charter to wit: the 'four freedoms' are highlighted and the relations of nations and people the coming of peace and harmony can be facilitated, and

"Whereas—Freedom of Speech, Freedom of Religion, Freedom from Want and Freedom from Fear should be the privilege of men everywhere and represent, when governed by justice and charity, the soundest work in which an ever-existing structure of the world may and can be safely erected, and

"Whereas—so frequently nations and persons place self-aggrandizement above the welfare and interest of other nations and persons with the result that many are denied the fundamental rights enunciated in the Four Freedoms now

"Therefore—be it resolved and it hereby is resolved that the Geneva Council above named unhesitatingly endorses our American agents and representatives and the agents and representatives of all peoples who are seeking to bring to reality the ideals which we feel are adequately expressed in the Four Freedoms and

"Be it further resolved and it hereby is resolved that said agents and representatives of all nations everywhere be blessed."

Reporting on the committee's findings, Justice Davidson said that "Communism nullifies the churches' efforts by nurturing base greed and materialism with the catch cry, 'What have the churches done for us?'" He warned that Communists have rallied strong support despite the opposition of Roman Catholics as well as of political organizations.
