Throughout the Rochester diocese special Easter music will be heard at the Masses in all churches. Sermons will be in keeping with the Feast of the triumph of the Savior over death.

Assisting the Bishop at the Pro-Cathedral will be the Rt. Rev. Msgr. George V. Burns, pastor and other priests of the Pro-Cathedral.

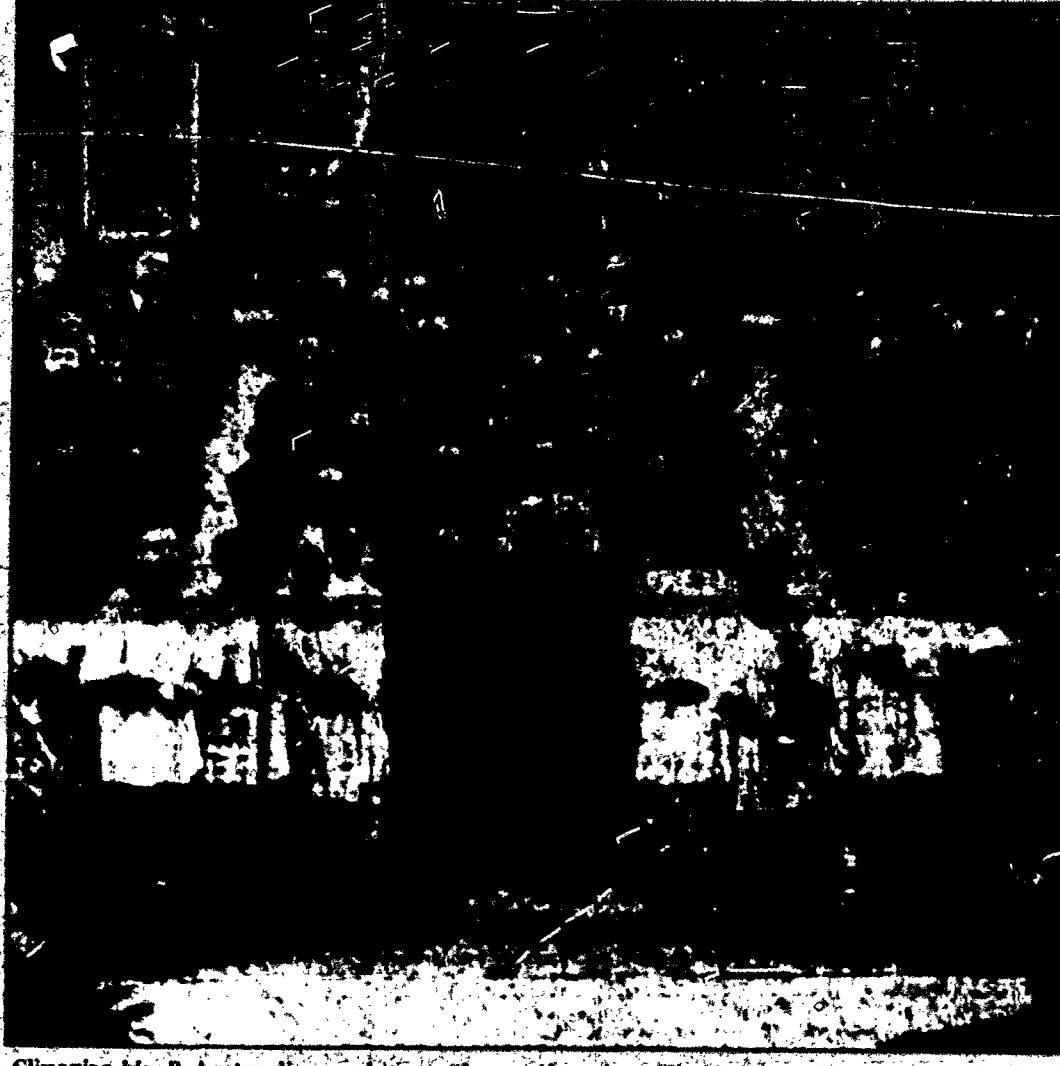
**Mass Chorus on Stage**

The Bishop will officiate at the Mass of the Precinct at 9 a. m. in the Pro-Cathedral on Good Friday. The three hours services will be conducted, beginning at noon in the Pro-Cathedral and in downtown churches where many chaplains are permitted to attend by their chaplains allowing time off.

On Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday, the COURIER JOURNAL and other diocesan offices will be closed.

### Protests Back Hoover, Hailed By Congressman

Protests which poured into the Washington office of Congressman George F. Rogers of Rochester were "indicative of an aroused and indignant public" protesting the subversive group activity against J. Edgar Hoover, an director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

The mass of correspondence he received "indicates clearly that Mr. Hoover has the confidence of the people of our community."

These expressions of Representative Rogers were contained in letters sent to members of the Holy Name Society who followed the suggestion of Ed Egan, Bishop Kearney in February to counter a movement seeking to cast Hoover as head of the S. P. R. C. in Rochester.

In a letter to Frank E. Wolfe, past president, Rochester Diocesan Holy Name Union, Mr. Rogers stated:

"I believe wholeheartedly, with you that Mr. Hoover is one of our outstanding public officials. He did an extraordinary job in preventing sabotage and espionage during the war without resorting to witch-hunting."

"I have made a careful investigation of the matter and can assure you without qualification that there is no intention on the part of the present administration to dispense with Mr. Hoover's services."

In another letter which appeared in the current issue of the "Rochester Post-Opinion" and was sent to a Holy Name member, the Congressman stated:

"The many protests which have been pouring into my office are indicative of an aroused and indignant public over the activities of subversive groups who are purporting to put on a concert of protest to cast Mr. Hoover, I do not know of any person who is held in higher esteem and respect by the American people than J. Edgar Hoover."

"There is no denying the fact that crime, the Congressman wrote, "which follows the rise of war, is the greatest danger to the safety of our country. It is of paramount importance to have the FBI Chief, who has accomplished so much in keeping under control the activities of the Bureau of Investigation."

### Enviably Record Set By Foster Parents

Nearly 800 homeless children were placed by Catholic Charities in over 150 of Monroe County's 400 Catholic foster homes during the last twelve months, officials of the organization announced today. Periods of sponsorship for individual children ranged from 4 hours to the full year, and totaled 573 years of child care.

Enviably records set by these parents, who with 20 others under the supervision of the Monroe County Child Placement Agency, 170 State Social Welfare Department and the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, have been invited by Most Rev. James E. Kearney to a Mass meeting April 23 in Sacred Heart Pro-Cathedral, and during the first to whole-hearted cooperation of the parents themselves and secondly to careful supervision by the agencies concerned, the spokesman stated.

Foster parents caring for children must qualify under 30 rules set by the State Department, covering social and general environment, financial, religious maintenance of religious and moral standards and ability to provide adequate personal care, as well as clean and comfortable accommodations. It was pointed out where families or relatives of the children are unable to contribute to their support, an allowance of \$5 per week for infants, \$7 for older children is made, as well as free clothing, medical and dental care.

Case histories were cited to show that foster parents receive the same respect and devotion of love and desire for children obtaining companionship for children of their own and where children of only one sex were present especially, association with children of the opposite sex. Length to which the devotion of such foster parents could be illustrated by the case of one woman who had taken charge of a two-month-old baby for an afternoon and had, without hope of remuneration, washed and ironed the baby's clothes and bathed the infant as well as that it would be "clean and pretty" for other foster parents.

In the course of 11 years another woman had taken a total of 52 infants into her home and prepared them for adoption by others. Some had kept the same children for as long as 16 years, treating them exactly as their own. One man had taken 22 boys since 1932, teaching them hobbies and manual training. A family had sponsored 3 children because their mother, a neighbor, was incurably ill with cancer.
