Father Plassman Flying to Europe

Saint Bonaventure, N. Y. — The Very Rev. Thomas Plassman, O.F.M., president of Saint Bonaventure College, expects to leave for Europe, by plane May 10, it has been revealed at the college.

As previously announced, Father Thomas has been appointed Visitor-General of the Holy Cross Franciscan province, located in Saxony and Westphalia, Germany. In his capacity as personal representative of the highest official in the Franciscan Order in the world, he will officially visit each friar and monastery of that province. He will be thus able to give a first-hand report of conditions in that section of Europe.

Father Thomas expects to leave the Marine terminal, LeGuardia Field by plane at noon of May 10. After stopping at Gander, Newfoundland, and Shannon airport in Eire, he expects to arrive at Orly Field, Paris, at 1 P. M. the following day. He will make use of a TWA Transworld Airline plane for his trans-Atlantic trip.

It was also revealed, at St. Bonaventure that Father Thomas has been recently appointed Auxiliary Chaplain by the Military Ordinate in New York City, and will therefore travel in the uniform of that office.
