Good Friday: 8:00 a. m. Mass of Presentation followed by adoration of the cross. Collection for Holy Land during Mass. 12 noon to 2:00 p. m., The Three Hours Agony of Our Lord. Mass by Rev. Thomas Sullivan, O.P. Stations of the Cross at 3:30 p. m. and adoration of the cross 7:00 p. m. Stations of the Cross followed by adoration of the cross.
Holy Saturday: 7:00 a. m. Mass of Resurrection. 9:00 a. m. Mass and Holy Communion. After Mass distribution of Easter Water until 10:00 a. m. and from 2:00 p. m. to 4:00 p. m. Stations of the Cross and 7:00 to 9:00 p. m. Celebration, especially for the men of the Parish and women who wish to receive Holy Communion.
Easter Sunday: Masses and Holy Communion 8:00 a. m., 7:00 a. m., 9:00 a. m., 10:00 a. m., and High Mass at 11:00. Low Mass at 12 Noon.
"All parishioners should seize the opportunity to receive Holy Communion on this joyous Holy Day," the notice said.
