Cardinal Asks World Based on Charity

Washington — (AP) — A rebuilding of the world in spirit of charity was the aim of Cardinal Sittich, Archbishop of Chicago, in a nationwide radio broadcast last week.

The Cardinal spoke as chairman of the Bishop's War Emergency and Relief Committee over the network of the American Broadcasting Company.

Cardinal Sittich reminded that the appeal was based on the words of Christ — "Whatever you do unto these my least brethren, you do unto Me." He emphasized that in Christian language, the rich women and children in their suffering within the great human family are "our brothers," and that something more than "lip service" is asked for their aid.

"Many things our troubled world sorely needs. Who will deny that above all other things it needs charity? We see what havoc hate has wrought. It has destroyed cities and villages. It has ruined national economies and it has brought misery into the lives of millions. The tyrant exploits and persecuted hate and called it class. Let us rebuild the world in charity. When we love we are just. When we do not love how can there be justice in us?"

Pilgrimage Set For British

London — (AP) — The British Union of Catholic Mothers is planning to hold a national pilgrimage to the Shrine of Our Lady of Walsingham in Norfolk, 25 miles from Norwich, which it hopes will be "the greatest ever held there since the Reformation."

To insure the largest possible attendance, traveling expenses will be pooled so that the cost to each person will be the same.

Dating back before the Norman Conquest in the 11th century, the shrine of Our Lady of Walsingham was reputed to be one of the greatest pilgrimage centers in Christendom. Pilgrimages to the Shrine were forbidden after the Reformation, but were resumed 75 years ago. During the war many American service men and women visited the shrine.

48-Hour Census To Be Taken In St. Augustine's Parish

St. Augustine's Parish will conduct the "Forty-Eight Hour Census" on Sunday, April 28, the Rev. John M. Duffy, Pastor, has announced. Some 200 workers will invade the confines of the parish Sunday, between 1 and 2, leaving the census forms to be filled out. Completed forms will be collected on Tuesday evening between the hour of 7 and 8. Some 4,200 houses will be canvassed for Catholic residents Sunday afternoon.

Parishioners have been urged to have one member of the family at home during the hour designated to receive the census forms, and again on Tuesday evening when the form will be collected. Sealed envelopes will be provided to guarantee secrecy. Since every house in the parish will be called upon parishioners have been asked to acquaint their non-Catholic neighbors with the plan.

The "Forty-Eight Hour Census" originated in the Diocese of Brooklyn and has been used with success in many parishes in the East. Through the cooperation of the parishioners and the efforts of a large number of the laity acting as voluntary census takers, the energy of priests and religious over a long period of time is saved, and complete information concerning the spiritual condition of each member of the family is achieved in two days' time.
