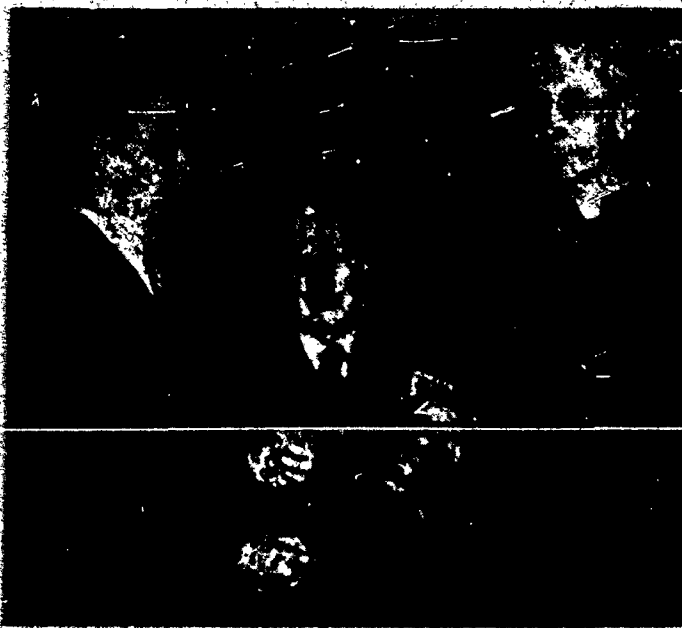

KNIGHTS SCORE POLAND DEMAND

Charging that the Polish government is a "satellite" of Soviet Russia, the Fourth Degree Assembly of the Rochester Knights of Columbus has scored Poland's demand that the United Nations break all diplomatic relations with the government of Spain.

The K. of C. protest was embodied in a resolution addressed to President Truman, Secretary of State James Byrnes, and U. S. Representative to the United Nations Security Council, Edward Stettinius.

Implying to Russia's hostile designs on Spain, the resolution warned that Communist propaganda aims to bring about intervention of the United States in problems of government which are the proper concern of the Spanish people.

Former Envoy to Vichy France, Paris — (NC) — Viscount de Fontenay, one time French Ambassador to the Holy See, was cited in Versailles at the age of 82. A veteran diplomat he was assigned to the Holy See in 1929.

Goes to Nuremberg
Rome — (RNS) — Baron Ernst von Weizsacker, German Ambassador to the Vatican, has left Rome for Nuremberg to appear as a witness at the trial of Nazi war criminals. This is the first time the German representative has left Vatican City since the arrival of Allied occupation troops in June, 1944.

Priest Praises Soviet Stand Of N. D. Alumni

Rev. Dr. George F. Kottell this week applauded the action of Thomas F. Byrne of Cleveland, National president of the Notre Dame Alumni Association, who wired UN delegate Edward R. Stettinius urging the investigation of Europe's Soviet-dominated governments, if Franco Spain is to be similarly investigated.

Addressing seventy members of the Notre Dame Club at Rochester, president of the Alumni Hotel to honor that the war was won, Dr. Kottell commended the Association on its diocesan president's words in the name of its 30,000 members.

Only reason Germany is an intent on destroying the existing power in Spain, Dr. Kottell declared, is that she represents the only spot in the world where Communism went down in humiliating defeat when brought to the test.

Challenge To Catholics
He pointed to Russian Communism as the only existing obstacle to world peace and offered a challenge to Notre Dame men as Catholics to assert their influence upon American public opinion by the intelligent use of the ballot, regardless of previous party ties.

Averting that government leaders today are "selling Americanism down the river," the speaker pointed out that the United States, by all rights the most powerful nation in the world, is weak and adrift in a sea of appeasement.

The oppressed nations of Central Europe, said Dr. Kottell, were looked in vain to this country to relieve them of the barbaric yoke, are now endeavoring to get the great steel curtain of Red Army censorship.

He reminded the group many of whom are World War II veterans that over 10,000,000 Americans shared their blood for a principle a principle that is embodied by the Star Spangled Banner. He charged the men of

Washington — Norman A. O'Brien, diocesan secretary of the National Council of Catholic Men, was elected to the NCCM Council of the Rochester Diocese.

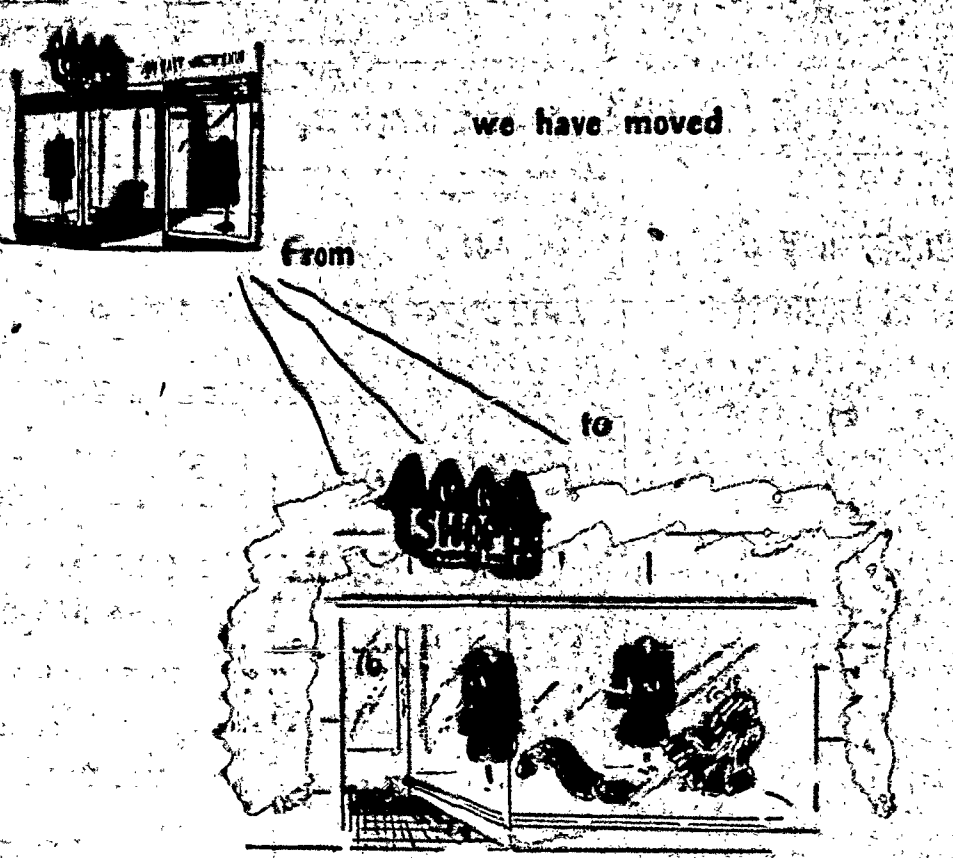

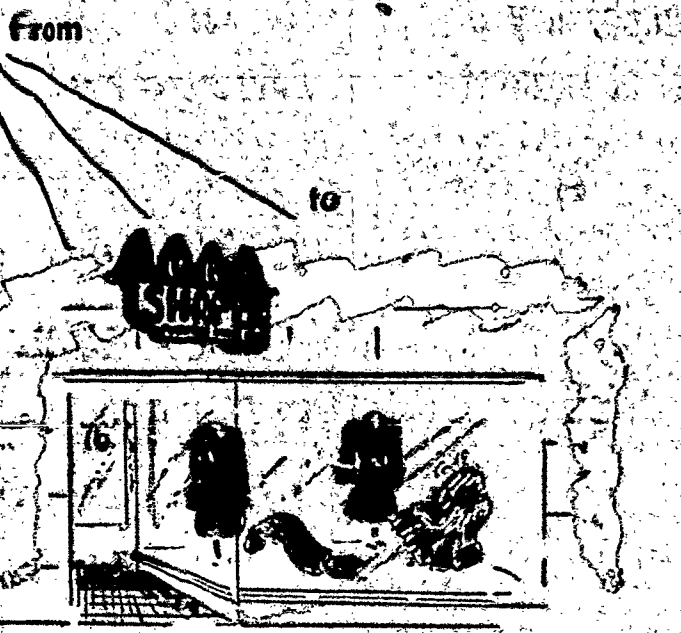
The occasion was the 23rd annual Notre Dame Night which was observed by groups of Notre Dame alumni throughout the diocese.
