He is coming to this country to attend the centenary celebration of the granting of Fordham University's charter by the State of New York. During his stay in this country, Cardinal Griffin will be the guest of His Eminence Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York.

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Hopalong Cassidy And 'The Outlaw'

Hopalong Cassidy is not well pleased with Howard Hughes. In his general way the celebrated actor who recently took his own identity in the character of the popular Western movie hero, takes to task all the Hollywood producers who would violate the one remaining film theme which breathes the sweetmeat of the open air.

William Boyd has somewhat the same deep respect for the great outdoors. The beauty of the wild reminds him of the master; he finds health, happiness and all the fun a man would wish for among the trees, the mountains and along the cool streams.

An actor rather than a cowboy, Bill Boyd brought to life the Clarence E. Mulford character of Hopalong Cassidy nine years ago, since when he has made fifty-four Cassidy pictures and run up a record as the actor who has played a single character longer than any other. Every film has made profits; almost every one has been morally good enough for any type of audience.

Now Bill Boyd has acquired

complete control of all the rights

to Hopalong Cassidy as screen, radio and television property. Soon we may get some good Cassidy stories on the air (and we must admit "the air" needs sweetening). Later we may look for the same galloping hero via television; but meanwhile, there are plans to make six new pictures. "We'll make them," says Bill, "in five weeks, and they'll cost only around \$90,000 apiece. Just the same I see no reason why they shouldn't be based on good sound stories with some suspense value instead of just one long chase after another."

Hopalong Cassidy (spardon, Bill Boyd) thinks that the earlier Westerns need modernizing to keep up with the movie-wise audience of today: "Once we could get a lot of cowboys together, have them talk about what they were going to do; go into some action scenes of galloping horses and men getting shot off the rocks, then go back again to the sheriff and his men talking the outlaws just where they went wrong and the film was finished."

"Today we need suspense as well as action and action must be related logically to story. We'll probably shoot fewer men but when we do shoot anyone there'll be better reason. Kids no matter whether they're eight or eighty, don't go for killing just for killing's sake."

Audience For Westerns

Bill Boyd rejects the snobbish Hollywood notion that Westerns are merely for patrons of low IQ. "I never have believed in Western characters who talk as if they'd never seen the inside of the old schoolhouse," Boyd says. "In the Hopalong series you will not catch anyone saying 'which way done he go' and somebody else replying 'he went thattaway doggern it.' That sort of thing in movies is insulting to simple country people and is apt to teach youngsters come bad grammar."

As Bill says, a boy, no matter what his age, has to have a hero. He might as well be a hero, kind of hero anyone of decent instincts can respect. Hughes makes headlines today, but Hopalong will be with us long after the outlaw has paid the penalty.

Franciscan Named

To Roach Relief Unit

New York — (NC) — The Rev. Ermin E. Klaus, O.F.M., a member of the New York Franciscan Province, has left the United States for the American Zone of Occupation in Germany, where he will represent War Relief Services-National Catholic Welfare Conference on a committee of the Council of Relief Agencies Licensed for Operation in Germany (C.R.A.L.O.).

The committee will act as a liaison between the United States Military Government in Germany and the German Central Committee, which is composed of four leading German Welfare agencies.

One of these four agencies is Caritas-Verband, through

which War Relief Services-N.C.W.C. distributes relief goods in Germany.



Paris — (C.N.C.) — Major General Robert A.
