Father Malley Named Newman Club Chaplain

Buffalo (Special)—Election of the Rev. John D. Malley of Rochester as Chaplain of the Central Province of College Newman Clubs in New York State was announced at the three-day convention which concluded here Sunday.

Father Malley, who is assistant pastor of Corpus Christi Church, Rochester, is also Chaplain of the Newman Clubs at the Rochester Eastman School of Music and the University of Rochester. In the principal address at the convention dinner Saturday evening, the Most Rev. James E. Keane, Bishop of Rochester and Episcopal Moderator of the National Newman Club Federation, outlined the qualities of a Newman Club member.

Newmanites, first of all, should be "intellectuals in their religion," the Bishop stated. He said the student delegates to all of the clubs in their Catholic knowledge, particularly through reading. "As college students, you are expected to be informed on other subjects and therefore you are expected to be informed in the matter of your Catholic Faith," he said.

Beyond understanding their religion, they should be "consistent Catholics," the Newmanites were told. "By practicing the principles of your faith," explained Bishop Keane, "you give good example which many times brings others to follow Christ."
