Workers Right To Organize Cited at Verein Meeting

Publication of the great social encyclical, *Quadragesimo Anno* by Pius XI in 1931, was celebrated at the Catholic Central Verein and National Catholic Women's Union monthly meeting held last Sunday at the Verein hall with Rev. Joseph J. Donovan, St. Margaret Mary's parish, as principal speaker.

Father Donovan began by outlining the background of the first encyclical, describing the industrial revolution and its effect on society, with special reference to economic liberalism.

Liberalism he said brought about exploitation of the workmen by unscrupulous employers. When properly analyzed, this philosophy degenerates into license, arrogating to itself all desired rights without recognizing the duties involved, and hence giving rise to conflicts which the modern age has inherited.

In contrast to this was the social assertion that the humanization of labor must be recognized, giving workers the right to organize, use the boycott and strike when necessary to enforce just demands.

Workers' right to the living wage and the state's duty to protect the worker were reiterated by Father Donovan, together with the Catholic worker's duty to get into the fight by using rights of the worker.
