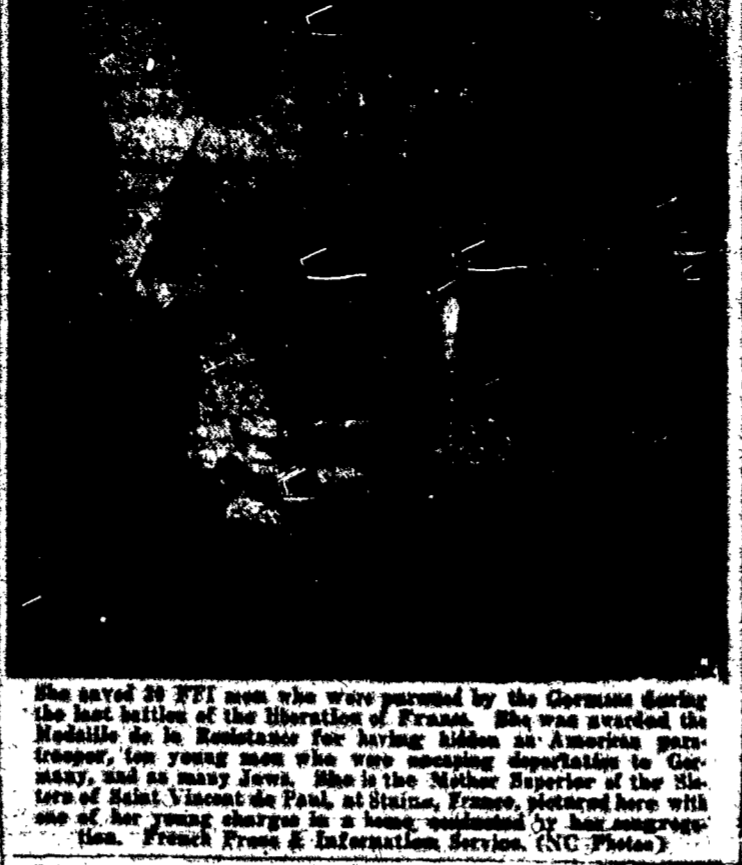
Complete Reporting Needed to Understand Spanish Catechism

(This is the second of two articles by Mr. de Luis in which he comments upon a Madrid dispatch of New York Times writer Cyrus L. Sulzberger concerning the denial of basic freedoms which Mr. Sulzberger found in a "compulsory" Spanish Catholic catechism.)

By FRANCISCO DE LUIS (Madrid Correspondent, N.Y. Times) Madrid — One of the principal themes in New York Times writer Cyrus L. Sulzberger's syndicated attack on a Spanish Catholic catechism "compulsory" in all State elementary schools, as an antagonist to the basic freedoms was that the catechism condemned "Liberalism."

The catechism in question — one of many editions of a seventeenth-century catechism of the Jesuit Father Ripalda — is not, it has been pointed out, any interpretation "compulsory" in all State elementary schools. It has also been noted in the previous article that the Spanish version of "Liberalism" to which the catechism refers is not identical with the philosophy which Americans associate with the name and that a knowledge of Spanish history and traditions is necessary to interpret the true significance of "Liberalism" to the catechism readers.

Y., Father Cuddy served in St. John's post, Cize, and in the American Occupation zone, before entering the Army.

Chaplain Cuddy's Plea Backed by Journalist

By WALTER L. MATT Father Paul J. Cuddy, an American army chaplain who has been stationed for some time in Compiègne, France, is somewhat depressed by the fact that Catholics have provided so little reading material for the armed forces overseas. In a letter to fellow priests back home, in which he stresses the urgent need for a wide diffusion of good Catholic literature, Father Cuddy — who is a priest of the diocese of Rochester, N. Y. — writes among other things:

"Since last August I have repeatedly written that we need some source of supplies of Catholic literature over here) where men can have access to it. These men can't only three weeks ago I was with Father O'Dea at Frankfurt, the center of American occupation. The place was destitute of any Catholic literature, except for a few Catholic magazines and an ancient copy of the 'Prayer Book.'"

"This I think is a sad commentary indeed and one which would have amazed me no end if I myself hadn't been overseas for three years. My own experience in army camps reaching from the Eastern end of the Mediterranean to the Western end and from the southern tip of Catholic Italy as far as Rome taught me that reading material is being provided for the American GI by the Christian Scientists (who had special reading rooms in almost every town I came to), by the YMCA, by the Quakers, by the Zionists and Lord only knows who else, but I can truthfully say that none came (except in Rome) in my three years overseas did I run into a Catholic reading room or even a Catholic pamphlet rack in all the camps, military office buildings, Red Cross establishments, GI hotels or any other military installations with which I came in contact!"

"A person ought to pause for a few moments to think this over. It is simply a fact in this day of worldwide disorder and collapse when every intelligent person sees not only Europe but America sinking into an almost hopeless economic, political and social abyss — that a problem such as the one mentioned by Father Cuddy seems almost negligible. In reality, however, there is only one way by which to prevent worldwide disintegration from going farther and that is by reaching out to all of our very own people, to the people who share our own faith, and to restore their faith in God and their fellowmen? Once again let's listen to what Father Cuddy has to say: 'Maybe I'm a crank,' he apologizes, 'but I make my blood boil to see opportunities passed by. Last Sunday I visited a German FWI stockade of 2400 men. The place has two German priests, one of whom takes care of other smaller stockades. One said to me, 'Father, the Allies knew they were going to win the war. Why did the Catholics make so previous the liberation, Catholic literature, for our army? How can we educate our men without Catholic literature? We have nothing absolutely nothing, while the Protestants receive a great deal of literature through the YMCA and through the Lutheran churches in America. I can't understand it!'

ITALY VICTORS FAVOR REPUBLIC

New York. — (NC) — The Christian Party, strongly Catholic and the most powerful single party in Italy, has voted 3-to-1 in favor of a republic for Italy. The action was taken at the party's convention recently held in Rome in preparation for the general election and the referendum to determine whether the monarchy should be retained, scheduled for next month, according to a monitored report of the Foreign Broadcast Intelligence Service based on accounts in Italian press dispatches.

The report stated that the party's leading sentiment on the referendum was to vote for the republic. The tally showed 730,500 in favor of a republic and 252,000 against it. The address of Alcide de Gasperi, president of the Cabinet of Ministers, was a feature of the convention. He asserted, according to the report, that "in the Christian Democracy, you this battle, you lose not merely an election battle, but that of the Italian people's civilization and culture."

NCWC Schedules Negro Seminar

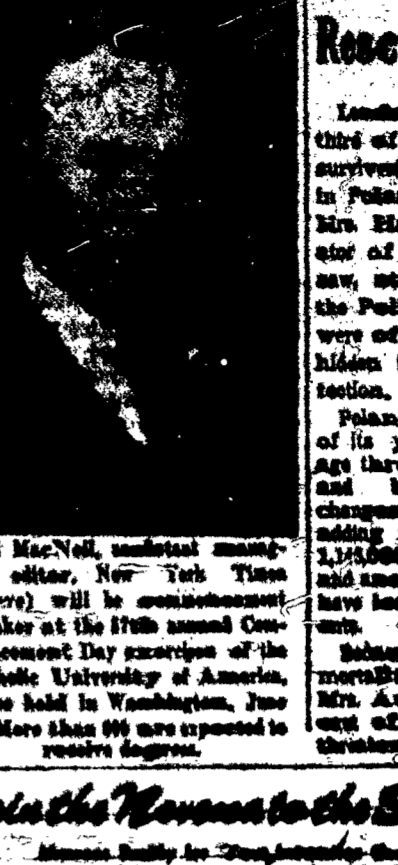

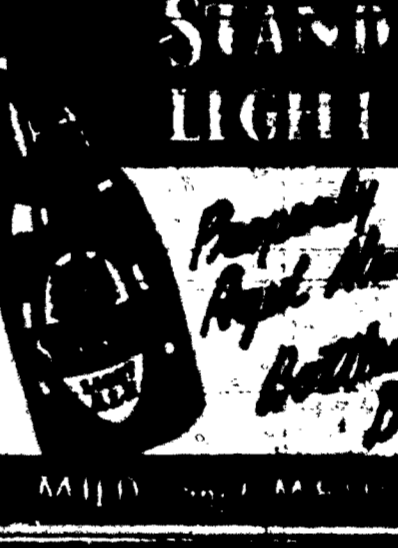
