\$1,005 Raised by School Children for Food Fund

The personal sacrifices of 50 school children of Holy Redeemer have paid off in the collection of \$1,005 for food to ease their starving little brothers and sisters in Europe and Asia.

Acting on the request of the Rev. E. William Stander, pastor, the children of the parish sacrificed their candy and movies for two weeks and saved the money for the Food for Children campaign. To this accumulation they added whatever money they collected in addition.

At the end of a candleless, sleepless two weeks, the children—some had gathered as much money for the campaign as the whole parish had donated. The school is conducted by the Sisters of Notre Dame under Sister M. Robertine, principal.

Covers were laid for 124 families and they were used in the table centerpieces.
