**MRS. LUCE ASKS U. S. ADMISSION OF WAR ORPHANS**

Washington, D. C. — (RNS) — Rep. Clara Booth Luce (R-Conn.) has introduced a bill in Congress to provide for admission to the United States of more than 2,000 orphaned children, all under 17 years of age, interned in camps in the American occupation zone in Germany.

The bill, House Joint Resolution No. 963, was referred to the Committee on Immigration and Naturalization.

In the preamble to the resolution, it is stated that "numerous organizations such as the Boy Scouts, the American Legion, and nearly all religious groups are now recording and advocating that particular care be given and attention paid to the displaced and abandoned children who are innocent victims of war."

**Klan Revival Hit Legal Barriers Sought**

In the light of five fiery crosses blazing atop Stone Mountain near Atlanta, Ga., the "invisible empire" of the Ku Klux Klan became visible again in a new effort at revival as white-stirring prejudices against Negroes, Jews and Catholics.

The Christian Council of Atlanta, a group of Protestant ministers, passed a resolution, which without naming the Klan, deplored "tendencies existing in certain quarters which develop hatreds among men, engender suspicion and make more uncomfortable the life of any group."

Legal action has also been initiated in the State of New York to rescind the Klan's charter, and Gov. Ellis Arnall of Georgia has consulted his Attorney General on what restrictive measures can be taken with respect to the Klan in Georgia.

**GEORGIA STARTS ACTION TO OUST KU KLUX KLAN**

Atlanta — (NC) — Gov. Ellis Arnall of Georgia has ordered the State Attorney General Eugene Cook, to institute court action against the Ku Klux Klan in an effort to revoke the organization's charter in Georgia.

About the same time, Marlon Allen, U. S. Collector of Internal Revenue, filed suit against the Klan to recover \$685,303, which the government charges is due in income taxes. The suit alleges the amount sought covers taxes due during the years 1931 through 1934 and for the year 1935.

The Georgia Governor expressed the opinion that the State Attorney has sufficient information in hand to go into the courts at once. He also instructed the State Attorney to confer with United States authorities on activities of the Klan.

**WAR PRISONER CAMPS FOUND 'UNSATISFACTORY'**

Washington — (NC) — While no news is available on the fate of hundreds of thousands of millions of German prisoners of war in the hands of the Russians, reports from reliable sources received here indicate that conditions in many prisoner camps, to a lesser degree, in Great Britain — leave much to be desired.

Many of these prisoners, still held in captivity more than one year after the end of hostilities in Europe, had been handed over to the French and British by the American authorities. It is recalled that earlier this year the conditions existing in French camps filled with German prisoners who were formerly in American hands led to official protests and French promises that conditions would be improved.

Characteristic of conditions that existed in some of these French camps is a letter from a prisoner in the camp of La Trinite, depicting the harsh if not inhuman treatment. During an inspection, French soldiers not only destroyed or stole personal belongings of many prisoners but even committed carnages in the camp chapel, the report states.

The altar was partly destroyed, the letter said, "and a chalice, given to the camp by an American Army chaplain, was stolen. Hosts were scattered and trampled on, hymn-books, Bibles and vestments were thrown on the ground and sullied."

On the following day, many sick prisoners were forced to walk four miles to a railroad station where they were searched again and beaten with rifles. The reports from Great Britain stress the bitterness of the prisoners, taken there from camps in the United States, at being held captives although they had been promised repatriation.

**MIRACLES ADVANCE LABOUR CAUSE**

Yakima City — (RNS) — At the order of His Holiness Pope Pius XII, a decree issued by the Sacred Congregation of Rites has been proclaimed which approves of the miracles proposed in the case of the canonization of Blessed Catherine Labouré, of the Congregation of Daughters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul.

The first miraculous cure concerns Josephine Gaudet, who was suffering from a serious heart ailment and had received the Last Sacrament. She was miraculously cured after the intercession of Blessed Catherine had been invoked.
