Hollywood Economy Means More Decency

There is, I am told, scarcely any limit to the lies one can

force from a set of statistics. There are, I believe, some figures that do not lie.

In the Year Book of Motion Pictures, published by "Film Daily" for instance, we find the estimated 1945 total cost of 1,000 movies made through last year.

Three hundred and nine feature films and 521 short films were approved by the Production Code Adminstration during

the year and the amount of money that went into them was approximately \$401,578,000.

In 1944, a slightly larger number of movies cost \$308,800,000 and way back in 1935, when the total number of feature films was well over 400, only \$125,000,000 was spent.

Close estimates of production costs in the intervening years prove that Hollywood has been spending more and more money making fewer and fewer films.

The average cost now is well over 100 per cent more than it was in the middle 20's just before the "talkies" came along.

Dizzy and Unrealistic

You may ask why I trouble to mention these figures at all; they are dizzy and to most of us entirely unrealistic.

We are mainly interested, are we not, in a fair supply of good movie entertainment? Unless we happen not to be interested in movies at all, when we shall doubtless stand utterly convinced that there is no such thing as a good movie anyway and that Hollywood wouldn't make it if there were.

If you've never encountered any of these Catholic Hollywood haters you should change places with me for a few weeks. They evidently believe that the best way to discourage bad movies is to deny the possibility that there could be any good ones.

11,240,000 American Catholics were to bury their heads in that particular pile of sand, the fact that would remain that 31,000 people are fully employed making Hollywood movies at a combined salary of around \$320,000,000 and that 63,000,000 ticket buyers pass the American box office every week of the year.

Wholesale confirmation of Hollywood and its movies, in terms of Catholic action, is no substitute for a policy of sane evaluation.

Hollywood Movies

That is why I believe Catholics ought to give a thought now, and then, not only to the films Hollywood makes, but to the methods and the money that go into the making of them.

Only in 1940, immediately after depression hit the U.S.A., did Hollywood drop back a notch in production output. In 1938 and 1939 the total cost of films had hovered around \$165,000,000, but once retrenchment was indicated Hollywood made just as many films for 1940 released and spent only \$150,000,000 doing it. The films were just as good, if not better. In 1945, for \$401,578,000 the Hollywood producers turned out more mediocre movies than in 1940.

My point is that the more extravagant these Hollywood produc-

ers are permitted to become the poorer, generally speaking is the resultant entertainment.

There have been some good films that cost vast fortunes. There have been even more good films that were made literally on a shoe-string."

Already theater attendances are slightly off the decline. More ticket buyers are going for low-priced seats. The big splurges over and Hollywood producers who try to look a year or two ahead are planning against the day when they will have to make movies on half the money they spent throughout the war.

This may give a fresh lease of life to those who write original screen stories and sell them to Hollywood for a mere fraction of what such over-exploited writers as Kathleen Winsor have been getting for blue and amber novels.

Archbishop Schremm wrote to the clergy: "These criticisms have been brought to the attention of the management and of the proper civil authorities but to no avail, simply because there seems to be no agreement as to what can be construed as subversive to public morals within the terms of the civil law."
