

Pontifical Rite For E. J. Dwyer, Papal Knight

Solemn Pontifical funeral services for Eugene J. Dwyer, 73, attorney for the Diocese of Rochester and a Knight of St. Gregory, were conducted Wednesday, June 19, 1945, in St. Mary's Church by His Excellency, Bishop James E. Kearney.

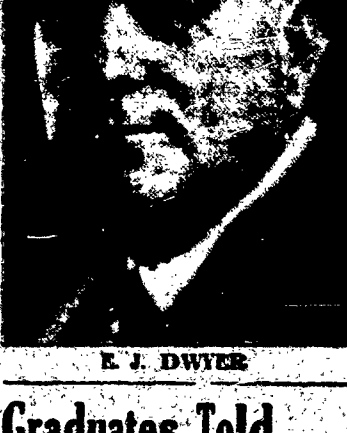
In poor health for some time, Mr. Dwyer went to St. Mary's Hospital eight weeks ago, where he underwent an operation. Death occurred Sunday afternoon, June 16, 1945, after he had been sent home from the hospital, apparently recovering, and returned.

Assisting Bishop Kearney at the Solemn Pontifical Funeral Mass were: the Rt. Rev. Msgr. William M. Hart, V.G., assistant priest; Rev. Dr. George F. Kettell, deacon; and Rev. Edward T. Meagher, subdeacon; St. Rev. Msgr. William F. Bergan and Rt. Rev. Msgr. George V. Burns, deacons of honor; Rev. Dr. John E. Maney, master of ceremonies; Rev. William J. Duggan, C.S.B., assistant master of ceremonies; Rev. Daniel R. O'Rourke, censor bearer; Rev. Joseph J. O'Connell, candle bearer; Rev. Thomas Brennan, book bearer; Rev. Daniel Sullivan, incense bearer.

In the sanctuary were the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Joseph S. Cameron and the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles F. Shay. The Mass was attended by thirty-five priests of the Diocese, many wives, and hundreds of Catholic laity.

Graduates Told To Dare to be Good Catholics

Eleven graduates of SS. Peter and Paul's School received their diplomas tonight (Thursday, June 20) at impressive services in SS. Peter and Paul's Church featured by sound counsel from their pastor, the Rev. William J. Naughton.

The main purpose of their training is that they be good Catholics.

Corning — Speaking before more than 250 members and candidates for the major Degree of the Knights of Columbus at a breakfast held Sunday morning at the Baron Steuben Hotel, Thomas J. McDonnell, Buffalo educator, urged the men to take up the challenge which has been thrust upon the world and to their utmost to combat the forces of Communism that threaten a true peace.

35th Year as Priest Marked by Fr. Dissett

By DOLORES HANRAHAN Horrell — The Rev. Andrew T. Dissett, pastor of St. Ann's Church, observed the 35th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood with a High Mass June 11, which was attended by parishioners and children of St. Ann's School. For the Mass, Father Dissett wore hand-worked and designed vestments, sent him from Germany by the Rev. John P. O'Malley, former assistant at St. Ann's.

This month also marked the seventh anniversary of Father Dissett's ordination to St. Ann's Church. He came to Horrell as administrator of St. Ann's on June 17, 1939, during the illness of the pastor, the late Rev. Jeremiah A. Maloy. In March, 1944, Father Dissett was appointed pastor by the Most Rev. James E. Kearney.

During his seven years at St. Ann's, Father Dissett has executed out 12 number of projects both for the spiritual and material welfare of the parish. He established the perpetual novena devotion in honor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help and erected a shrine bearing an original painting from Rome. He also instituted a public annual novena in honor of St. Ann which attracts crowds each year, both from Horrell and surrounding towns.

Father Dissett organized the Young Ladies Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary and reorganized the Holy Name and Rosary and Altar Societies.

During World War II he conducted numerous luncheons and retreats, as well as the daily recitation of the Rosary for the welfare of Horrell men and women who were serving in the armed forces.

A program of repairs on the Church rectory, convent and school is being carried on by Father Dissett. The Federation Building has been remodeled and the third floor leased to the State Health Department. St. Ann's Cemetery has been reconsecrated in accordance with Diocesan regulations and the Church and rectory grounds have also been beautified.

Before coming to Horrell, Father Dissett was pastor of St. Michael's Church in Lyons, during his 12 years there he was active in community as well as religious movements. He was responsible for the introduction of religious education classes which were taught there by the Blessed Trinity nuns whose convent was established during Father Dissett's pastorate. He also built a modern church hall and sponsored a program of social recreation for the townspeople.

In the interest of developing the economic life of Lyons, Father Dissett was instrumental in bringing industries to the community. He was setting chairman of the Lyons Chamber of Commerce, also honorary trustee of Gavitt National Bank, the latter appointment conferred by the Controller of Currency.

Before going to Lyons, Father Dissett served as assistant pastor in St. Mary's Church, Auburn; St. Patrick's, Mount Morris; St. John's, Clyde; St. Michael's, Penn Yan; and St. Stephen's, Geneva.

For six years he was chaplain at Auburn prison during which time his efforts in behalf of the prisoners won for him the title, "Parole Priest." He assisted the State Parole Board and through his intercession secured the release of many prisoners.

First contribution for the rehabilitation of St. Joseph's Hospital, following the disastrous flood came to the Diocese of St. Joseph, this week, in the form of a check for \$1,300 from Beth El B'nai Mitzvah.

The amount represented proceeds from a smoker conducted in Elmira by a Jewish group, the B'nai Brith Lodge at which Benny Leonard, famed undefeated lightweight boxing champion was featured. Guest speaker at the affair, Leonard started off the drive for funds by making the first contribution.

Milton Spiegel, program chairman, presented the check to Attorney John Sullivan of the Hospital Board of Directors.
