Communism Imperiling World Peace and U. S., Priest Tells Firemen

Geneva—In my mind, gentlemen, there is one real threat to world peace and that is Communism. Its iron screen is spread out round to the north and south embracing the Baltics and the Balkans and the countries in between," said the Rev. Robert Fennessy, assistant pastor of St. Stephen's Church, at the annual memorial services of the Western-Hesse-Compagny which was held on Sunday at St. Stephen's Church.

About two hundred members of the company attended the 7 o'clock Mass, and later marched in a body to the company rooms where breakfast was served.

Speakers for the occasion were Martin J. Brodzick, president of the company, and Charles L. McGuigan of the Fire Department.

George Handlan was toastmaster and introduced the guest speaker, Father Fennessy.

SAIDON LITTLE Face speaking with the quotation: "Spain has nothing to fear from the Hitler Nations," the words of the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt, Father Fennessy said at part.

"Our beloved flag, once the symbol of justice, charity, and freedom wherever in the world it was unfurled, is fast losing face with the smaller nations of the world. There are issues facing our beloved land which threaten our very National Honor.

"There is the unfinished business of Poland, and with her the Baltic States. Everyone knows that Poland today is simply the Warsaw provisional puppet government, set up and kept in power by the arms of Soviet Russia. There is no freedom there! Poland wants one thing—a free election, and the United States will 'take care' if she falls Poland. Poland was the first ally to repudiate the Axis; will she be the first to be forsaken by the Allies?"

"We are faced with another serious and all-important decision in Yugoslavia in the trumped charges raised against our former friend Mihailovich. We had been forced to reject him and accept instead a Communist stooge. Will the United States face also into the Balkans by sitting back idly, or will she demand an official sitting in on the trial of our former friend?"

"Thirdly, will the United Nations and the United States 'lose face' again in the present issue against Generalissimo Franco in Spain. Is he really a 'threat to World Peace' as puppet Poland charges? Apparently not, because the Subcommittee of the UN, for the investigation of Spain and Franco is forced to conclude after a thirty day investigation, that Franco is not a 'threat to World Peace', but to save face, it adds, that it may become a threat in the future."

Sees One Real Threat

"And yet, Giro, the Premier of the reconstituted Spanish government in exile" tells the U. N. that it must reject Franco and his Spain before September, or else. . . in other words, Giro issues an ultimatum."

How do the United States stand on this? For the U. N. is taking issue with Franco, and will be in the House of Commons, found no "threat to World Peace" in Spain, but will we face also as a danger to this land—or will we accept our selves and demand justice? Will the reconstituted nation of Spain, and Franco, face any real danger for such a fracture of justice? No, not a real threat, but a real threat to world peace.

College Professors' Need For Family Wage Stressed

Washington (NC)—Charging that the present wage for college professors "is based ultimately on the tradition that a college professor is both single and a recluse," Kerby Nell, associate professor at Catholic University of America here, predicts that unless some family wage plan is instituted in our colleges, good men will be drained off and our institutions of learning will become "intellectual graveyards." Mr. Nell makes this assertion in an article in the spring Bulletin of the American Association of University Professors.

"The ability of professors with families to survive financially is rapidly ebbing away," he states, adding that this is "admirably suited to collecting a good deal of mediocrity in our institutions of higher learning."

"The easiest and most satisfactory solution to the problem," Mr. Nell declares, "would be to introduce a system of family allowances that would guarantee every teacher enough to support each additional dependent." This would attract better men to the profession, he says, and would offer "a measure of economic security enabling the teacher to concentrate on his vocation instead of dissipating his energy in this pursuit of supplementary earnings."

"This system of family allowances is now in operation in more than 32 countries, the C. U. professor writes, adding that it has pointed up some of its benefits to Americans through its use by the United States Army and Navy and also in the Canadian Family Allowance Act. As a "conservative estimate," Mr. Nell says that an additional salary of \$500 a year should be made for each dependent.

Among participants in the celebrations will be the Very Rev. Robert L. Gannon, S.J., president of Fordham University, who will deliver the eulogy; the Rev. Peter M. Jacobs, S.J., the only Jesuit priest ever ordained; and the Rev. Armand M. Zeroli, spiritual director of the St. Isaac Jogues Association, which is sponsoring the event.

A permanent memorial which is being erected adjacent to the Blessed Sacrament Church prior to the occasion will contain statues and relics of St. Isaac Jogues and the other North American martyrs. The state of New York several years ago erected a monument to St. Isaac Jogues on the shores of Lake George.

100 Missioners Go To Africa Aboard Carrier

London (NC)—Nearly 100 Catholic missionaries have sailed from Southampton for Africa on the British aircraft carrier, H. M. S. Fenicer.

At Monrovia, British East Africa, the missionaries, forming the largest single group to leave this country for Africa, will split up into groups and trek overland to their stations. Many missionaries, nearly half of whom are Irish, have been waiting throughout the war years to return to mission posts.
