

Canadian Bishops Ask Purity Crusade Against Immorality

ROCKFORD — With a severe indictment of increasing immorality in Canada's everyday life, a joint pastoral signed by 21 members of the Canadian Hierarchy, advocates a "Crusade for Purity" and calls for strict ecclesiastical measures to curb sins on individual and family life and the life of the nation.

The pastoral was signed by His Eminence Rodger Cardinal O'Flaherty, O.M.I., Archbishop of Dubuque; Archbishop Alexander Macdonald of Ottawa; Archbishop Joseph Charbonneau of Montreal; Archbishop Georges Courtemanche of Rimouski, and 23 Bishops.

All Catholics are exhorted to share in the leadership of Catholic Action in bringing pressure upon those persons and circumstances responsible for immorality. The pastoral calls for perspectives in the present mode of dress and elimination of immorality in books, magazines, motion pictures, radio programs and other means of public entertainment.

Formation of a League of Decency and kindred organizations as a means of combatting profanity and providing suitable recreation is envisaged by the Bishops.

The Bishops deplore the practice on the part of both men and women of wearing lewd attire in public; the absence of adult surveillance at gatherings of the young; seemingly unrestricted use of contraceptives at parties attended by young adults; adults and immorality in books, comic strips, movies, radio programs and other means of public entertainment.

The great majority of the people, the pastoral says, are sound and moral, "but the danger of immorality is spreading, and above all the plague of immorality exists everywhere."

It is urged to make an appeal to Christian conscience to check this trend without delay, to open our hearts and minds to the Divine teachings.

The Bishops, recalling that certain existing statutes and ordinances pertain to these problems call upon the Government to enforce these measures and to institute other effective steps regarding public dress, motion pictures and other amusements.

The Bishops also urge the Government to prohibit women and youth from patronizing places of meat hours establishments where intoxicants are sold.

The pastoral states that when the time is opportune a League of Decency will be organized with the objective of defending public morality and placing suitable publications, movies, songs, radio programs and other amusements.

HEALTH BILL IS OPPOSED

MILWAUKEE — (NC) — Opposition to what he termed "one of the most revolutionary proposals on health" before the present session of Congress was expressed by Msgr. Maurice F. Gruber, first vice-president of the Catholic Hospital Association, at one of the meetings of its convention here.

It is before Congress proposed legislation, he said, "that would provide medical, dental, nursing and hospital care, even social service, for every future citizen, rich or poor alike. This service would be entirely free, with the government paying all the expense, beginning with prenatal care and extending to the last year. The most ardent advocate of State medicine could ask no more."

Questioning the necessity of such a program, Monsignor Gruber stated that "we have been

have provided themselves with more and better hospitals, far and away alike than can be found anywhere else."

CHINESE HIERARCHY PRECEDENTS CITED

Rome — (NC) — The recent raising of the Church in China from mission status to that of a fully-constituted national Church with its own resident Hierarchy presents an analogy with prior actions in India, Japan, and colonial territories in Africa. "Fides" Catholic mission news service recalls in a report here.

When India acquired its Hierarchy in 1858, it had but 1,500,000 Catholics compared to China's present-day 4,000,000, and at the same time the Hierarchy was constituted in Japan in 1861 there were but 40,000 Catholics in that country, Fides points out.

The Catholic Church in China in this century, previous to the April 11 decree which set up the Ecclesiastical Hierarchy, was organized into one diocese, one ordinariate on the Portuguese Macao Island, the Extrazonal Rito Ordinariate of Harbin for Russian Catholics in China and Manchuria, 33 Vicariates Apostolic, 13 Prefectures Apostolic, and one mission at Urga, Mongolia.

However, there had been an Archdiocese at Peking as far back as 1852, with several ecclesiastical districts — this in the time of John of Monte Carino, whose evangelical work brought at least 200,000 Chinese into the Church. But this Church, in fact, did not come into history until 1924 at the end of the 19th century. Again in 1924 following earlier missionary efforts by Jesuits, Dominicans, Franciscans and others, the two Dioceses of Peking and Nanjing were set up, and remained as such until 1934 when the Holy See split them into Vicariates.

Since the 20th-century city in which His Eminence Thomas Cardinal Wei SWP, will close the affairs of the Archdiocese of Peking, has itself changed for the third time as a residential see. Peking has been called the "City of the Sky" situated in the mountains, containing the capital and other important cities.

Argentine Bishop Scores Dictatorship

Buenos Aires — A sharp repudiation of dictatorship and a strong reminder of the source, the limits and the responsibilities of governmental authority was voiced here by Bishop Alvaro de Andrade, Titular of Temes, in accepting an honorary degree from the Faculty of Law and Social Sciences of the National University of Buenos Aires.

In conferring the degree, Dr. Horacio C. Alvarez, rector of the university, announced it was the first time in its history that the institution's Superior Council had bestowed an honorary degree by a unanimous vote and paid tribute to the Bishop's sound convictions on political and social questions and to his social apostolate founded on the Papal Encyclical. Bishop de Andrade has for many decades been a leading exponent in this country of Catholic thought on democratic freedoms and social and economic questions.

Declaring the foundation of true democracy "springs from Christianity" and that all auth-

ority has its source in God, Bishop de Andrade said these are themes in history when men appear who think themselves invested with the power of God and sometimes believe them-

selves capable of "taking His place." This is a blasphemous negation of Christianity, he said.

Christianity enhances

the dignity of the governed, not so guarantees the authority of those who govern," the Bishop declared, adding that "if there ever was a time when it was necessary to bring about a realization of the true doctrine of the origin of power, it is now."

He means established by God for transmitting authority,

he continued, "lead to a high conclusion, the obligation of all who guide human capacity to better the people materially and morally, to bring them to that level of responsibility which gives the right to choose their own governments."

Scot Bishops See Peace In Russia's Conversion

London — (NC) — The Bishops of Scotland have issued a statement in which they describe the persecution in East Europe as "perhaps surpassing in ferocity anything known in the days of Nero" and declared that no lasting peace was possible without Russia's conversion.

"As members of Christ's Mysterious Body, the faithful in those regions have a right to look to us for aid and above all for the assistance of our prayers," the Bishops declared. "The prayers directed by Leo XIII to be said after Low Masses are being offered for the conversion of Russia.
